

- ◆ The No. 3/3 South Carolina Gamecocks (6-0, 4-0 SEC) travel to Baton Rouge to face the No. 9/8 LSU Tigers (5-1, 1-1 SEC) in an SEC contest on Saturday, October 13. The game will be televised nationally on ESPN, beginning at 8 p.m. ET (7 p.m. in Baton Rouge).
- ◆ The Gamecocks have won a school-record 10 straight games (Florida, Citadel, Clemson, Nebraska, Vanderbilt, East Carolina, UAB, Missouri, Kentucky, Georgia) dating back to last season. The Gamecocks 10-game winning streak is the longest current streak among FBS teams, one ahead of Alabama, Oregon and West Virginia and surpasses the previous longest winning streak in school history of nine, set in 1984.
- ◆ The Gamecocks are off to a 6-0 start for the first time since 1988 and for just the third time in school history (also 1984). They have been 7-0 just once in their history (1984).
- ◆ The Gamecocks are ranked No. 3 in both polls. They have been ranked that high or higher just once in the poll released Nov. 13, 1984 when they were ranked No. 2.
- ◆ The Gamecocks are facing their second Top-10 opponent in as many weeks. They defeated No. 5 Georgia last week. Next up No. 4 Florida.
- ◆ Head coach Steve Spurrier has logged his 200th career collegiate victory (UAB) and his 250th overall coaching victory (Georgia) this season. He has 203 wins in the collegiate ranks and 47 as a head coach at the pro level.

A South Carolina win over LSU would...

- ◆ Stretch South Carolina's winning streak to 11 games, extending the longest in school history and keeping in tact the longest current winning streak among FBS teams.
- ◆ Give the Gamecocks a 7-0 record to start the season for just the second time in school history (1984).
- ◆ Be just the third Gamecock win over LSU in 20 tries and it's second win ever in Baton Rouge. The only previous Carolina win in the Bayou came on Oct. 1, 1994 by an 18-17 score.
- ◆ Most likely keep the Gamecocks ranked among the nation's top 3 teams for the second week in a row, something that has never been done in school history. They were No. 2 in the AP poll in 1984 for just one week.

SETTING THE STAGE: The No. 3/3 South Carolina Gamecocks (6-0, 4-0 SEC) face their second top-10 team in as many weeks when they travel to the Bayou to face the No. 9/8 LSU Tigers (5-1, 1-1 SEC) on Saturday, October 13. The game will be played at Tiger Stadium in Baton Rouge (92,400) with kickoff set for 8 pm ET. The sold out game will be televised on ESPN with Brent Musburger and Kirk Herbstreit in the booth and Heather Cox working the sidelines. John Sadak and Rocky Boiman have the national radio call for Dial Globe Sports.

A LITTLE HISTORY: 2012 marks the 119th season of intercollegiate football at the University of South Carolina, dating back to 1892. It is the 106th-consecutive year in which South Carolina has competed on the gridiron. The University did not field a team in either 1893 or 1906. Carolina is 17 games over the .500 mark with an all-time record of 560-543-44. The Gamecocks were nine games under .500 until head coach Steve Spurrier took the reins in 2005, but are 26 games over since.

GAMECOCKS AND TIGERS: LSU holds a commanding 16-2-1 advantage in the all-time series with South Carolina. The Bayou Bengals own a 10-1 advantage in games played in Baton Rouge, hold a 5-1-1 lead in games played in Columbia, and won the only neutral site contest, taking the 1987 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla. LSU has won the last four meetings, including a 24-17 win in Columbia in 2008 in their last meeting and a 28-16 win in Baton Rouge in 2007, the last time they met in Louisiana. South Carolina's last win came by an 18-17 margin in Baton Rouge on Oct. 1, 1994. The Gamecocks only win over the Tigers in Columbia was back in 1930 in the first meeting between the two schools, a 7-6 Carolina win.

THE LAST TIME THEY MET: Jarrett Lee went 16-of-26 for 189 yards and LSU held South Carolina to minus-7 yards in the fourth quarter as the No. 13 Tigers beat the Gamecocks 24-17 on October 18, 2008. LSU (5-1) took the lead for good on Charles Scott's 2-yard touchdown run with 4:16 to go. It capped a grinding, 83-yard drive that took more than six minutes off the clock. Then Curtis Taylor picked off Stephen Garcia two plays later, souring an otherwise remarkable game for the freshman, who accounted for 230 of 254 yards for South Carolina (5-3) in his first career start. LSU held South Carolina to 42 total yards in the second half after allowing two touchdowns in the final 2:28 of the first half. For more on the game, see page 12 of the notes.

THE LAST TIME IN THE BAYOU: The 3-0 and 12th-ranked Gamecocks ran into a buzzsaw in the form of second-ranked LSU in Baton Rouge on Sept. 22, 2007 and came back from the Bayou with their first loss of the season, a 28-16 setback. The Gamecocks scored first, but LSU used a solid ground game, which rolled up 290

yards, to score the next 28 points. Carolina tried to rally late with two fourth-quarter scores, but it wasn't enough. South Carolina threw for 244 yards compared to LSU's 70, but the ground game proved to be the difference, as the Gamecocks could only muster 17 net yards rushing on 27 attempts on a rainy day in the Bayou.

CAROLINA'S LAST WIN OVER LSU: The Gamecocks went into the Bayou on Oct. 1, 1994 and escaped with an 18-17 win. The Gamecocks trailed the entire contest until Stanley Pritchett plunged in from the onevard line with 12:52 remaining in the game for the deciding points. Pritchett finished the day with 18 carries for 90 yards. LSU held a 14-12 lead at the intermission in front of 63,281 rain-soaked fans and built the lead to 17-12 entering the final stanza. Carolina quarterback Steve Taneyhill was 23-for-30 for 157 yards and a touchdown, as the Gamecocks rolled up 262 yards of offense compared to 209 for LSU. It was just the Gamecocks' second win over LSU in school history, the first coming in the first meeting between the two schools, a 7-6 win on Oct. 11, 1930 in Columbia. Both Gamecock wins over LSU have been by a single point.

THE HBC VS. LSU: South Carolina head coach Steve Spurrier is 11-3 all-time against LSU, posting a 6-0 record when playing at The Swamp in Gainesville and a 5-2 record when playing in Tiger Stadium in Baton Rouge. He came up on the short end in the only meeting in Columbia. His offenses have scored more than 20 points 11 times in the 14 meetings, rolling up 454 points for an average of 32.4 points per game. His defenses have surrendered more than 21 points just three, allowing just 197 total points, an average of 14.1 points per game.

TOP-10 MATCHUP: This is just the sixth time in school history that Carolina has entered a game ranked in the Top-10 and playing another Top-10 opponent, but the second in as many weeks. The Gamecocks are

HOT AS THEY COME: The Gamecocks' 10-game winning streak is the longest current winning streak in the country. Alabama, Oregon and West Virginia are right behind with nine consecutive wins.

IN FRONT IN THE SEC: The Gamecocks are 4-0 in SEC play for just the second time in their 21-year history in the league. In 2001 the Gamecocks opened with wins at Georgia, at Mississippi State, vs. Alabama and at Kentucky to go 4-0 in SEC play before losing at Arkansas and finishing 5-3 in league action. Last year's

squad opened with wins at Georgia and vs. Vanderbilt before losing to Auburn. That team finished a school-best mark of 6-2 in SEC action.

THE HEAD BALL COACH: Steve Spurrier is in his eighth season directing the Gamecock football program. He has logged a 61-35 mark (.635) in Columbia. Coach Spurrier needs three wins to tie and four wins to take sole possession as the school's all-time leader in career victories. The Head Ball Coach ranks second on the school's all-time wins list with 61 behind only Rex Enright (64) and is tied for second in games coached with Paul Dietzel at 96 games behind Enright (140). Spurrier owns a 203-75-2 mark (.729) in 23 seasons as a collegiate head coach, with stops at Duke and Florida before his stint at South Carolina.

TOPS IN HIS FIELD: Steve Spurrier became just the 71st head college football coaches (all divisions) and the 22nd in Division I history to record 200 wins when he accomplished that feat against UAB. He ranks fourth among active Division I coaches with 203 wins.

REACHING 250: In addition to his 203 wins as a college coach, Steve Spurrier has an additional 47 wins as a head coach at the professional level, giving him 250 career coaching wins.

UNCHARTED TERRITORY: With the win over Georgia, the Gamecocks became bowl eligible for the eighth time in as many seasons under head coach Steve Spurrier. Coach Spurrier has taken the Gamecocks to six bowl games in his first seven seasons. They were not selected following the 2007 season with a 6-6 record. No other coach in Carolina history has taken the Gamecocks to more than three bowl games (Jim Carlen and Joe Morrison). Coach Spurrier is 2-4 in bowl games at South Carolina. He and Lou Holtz are the only Gamecock coaches to post two bowl victories.

GOOD HOME COOKIN': The Gamecocks have won their last eight games at Williams-Brice Stadium. Carolina is 4-0 at home this season. The Gamecocks were 6-1 at home in 2011, the third straight year in which they won six-of-seven home contests. The only home losses in the last three years came to top-ranked Florida in 2009, to 17th-ranked Arkansas in 2010 and to defending national champion Auburn in 2011. Carolina is 24-3 in its last 27 home games.

AND NOT BAD ON THE ROAD EITHER: With two SEC road wins this season, Carolina has won eight of its last nine true road games since falling at Kentucky in 2010. The Gamecocks had their school record sixgame road winning streak snapped at Arkansas late in the 2011 season. Carolina finished the 2011 campaign

GAINING THE SWEEP: The Gamecocks are 4-0 against SEC Eastern Division foes this season, winning the season opener at Vanderbilt, then defeating Missouri, Kentucky and Georgia over the last three weeks. They posted a perfect 5-0 mark against SEC Eastern Division rivals in 2011, a first in school history. They have won 12 straight and 13 of their last 14 contests within the division. ABOUT LAST WEEK: The sixth-ranked Gamecocks put up 21 first quarter points and never looked back as they routed fifth-ranked Georgia, 35-7 at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia last Saturday night. The Gamecocks drove the field on their first two possessions for touchdowns, then got a back-breaking 70vard punt return for a score from Ace Sanders. The Gamecock defense held the touted Bulldog freshman running back duo of Todd Gurley and Keith Marshall to just 76 rushing yards combined. Meanwhile Marcus Lattimore rumbled for 109 and Connor Shaw added 78 on the ground for the Gamecocks. Shaw completed just six-of-10 passes, but it was good for 162 yards and two scores. Carolina outgained the high-powered Georgia attack, 392-224. Georgia avoided the shutout with a score in the final two minutes of the contest.

THAT'S A RECORD: A record crowd of 85,199 witness the Gamecocks win over Georgia last week. That bettered the previous Williams-Brice Stadium mark of 85,000, set against Clemson in 2001.

THE DRIVE: The Gamecocks final scoring drive of the Georgia game was a 14-play, 89-yard drive that consumed 9:28 on the clock. All 14 plays were running plays, culminating with Connor Shaw's seven-yard TD run. It was the longest drive by time by the Gamecocks under Steve Spurrier.

ONE AND DONE: The Gamecocks threw and completed just one pass in the entire second half against Georgia. That was a 62-yard completion from Connor Shaw to D.L. Moore. It was the longest reception of Moore's career and set up a Carolina touchdown. For the game, Shaw was just 6-of-10 but threw for 162 yards and two scores.

SHAW AT THE HELM: Connor Shaw is 13-1 as a starting guarterback, the best record after 14 games of any signal-caller in Carolina history. The 6-1, 207-pounder junior from Flowery Branch, Ga. can beat you with his legs (second on the team with 64 carries for 281 yards) or his arm (75.7 percent completion percentage with 7 touchdowns and 2 interceptions). His 184.69 passing efficiency rating leads the SEC and would rank second in the country behind West Virginia's Geno Smith, but he is one attempt shy of qualifying by the NCAA standard. For his career, he has completed 68.5 percent of his passes (tops in school history) for 2,404 yards and 22 touchdowns with 10 interceptions. He also has rushed 231 times for 971 yards with nine scores. Shaw was honored as the SEC's co-Offensive Player of the Week against Mizzou.

THROWING STRIKES: When the Gamecocks pitch it around the park, there's been no one who has been more accurate in school history than **Connor Shaw**. Three of the top 5 quarterbacks in completion percentage have worked under Coach Spurrier:

RED HOT QB: Connor Shaw set a school record by completing his final 20 pass attempts in the win over Missouri. That was just three shy of the SEC single game mark of 23, set by Tennessee's Tee Martin in 1998. Shaw finished the day 20-of-21, (.952), topping the previous South Carolina record of .941, set by Gordon Beckham (16-of-17) against North Carolina in 1981. He threw for 249 yards and two TDs. He came back the following week at Kentucky and hit on 15-of-18 passes for 148 yards with two scores. Over the last three games, Shaw has completed 41-of-49 (83.7 percent) for 559 yards and six touchdowns with no INTs.

THOMPSON STEPS IN AND STEPS UP: Redshirt sophomore **Dylan Thompson** made his first start in place of the injured Connor Shaw against ECU and responded with an impressive performance. After entering the game with just two completions in five career attempts for 17 yards, Thompson connected on 21-of-37 passes for 330 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions. He came off the bench against UAB after Shaw was re-injured and produced again, hitting 5-of-10 passes for 177 yards and two TDs. For the season, Thompson is 27-of-53 for 510 yards and five touchdowns with no INTs. He has a passing efficiency rating of 162.91, the third-best mark in the SEC.

THAT'S EFFICIENT: Carolina quarterbacks lead the SEC in passing efficiency, posting a 180.9 rating through six games. They are completing 64.9 percent of their passes and are tied with Tennessee for the most

MORE FROM LATTI: Marcus Lattimore scored against Georgia last week and now has nine touchdowns this season. He is second in the SEC, averaging 9.0 points per game. Lattimore has scored in each of his last seven games and in 21 of his 26 career contests. He is the school's all-time leader with 39 career touchdowns and with 36 career rushing touchdowns. He ranks third on the school's all-time points scored list with 234 and became just the fifth player in Carolina history to eclipse the 200-point plateau. Lattimore ranks in a tie for fifth among active NCAA players in rushing TDs (the only junior in the top eight). For more Lattimore numbers, see page 13 of the notes.

BREAKING THE CENTURY MARK: The Gamecocks have three tailbacks who have rushed for 100 or more yards in a game for a combined 17 times. Junior Marcus Lattimore leads the way with 11 100-yard rushing games, while senior Kenny Miles and sophomore Brandon Wilds each have three 100-yard rushing contests. In addition, quarterback Connor Shaw has one 100-yard rushing game to his credit.

ELEVEN FOR MARCUS: Tailback **Marcus Lattimore** has returned to the gridiron after suffering a season-ending knee injury at Mississippi State last October. The junior carried 23 times for 110 yards and two TDs in the opener at Vanderbilt earning SEC Offensive Player of the Week accolades. He had 23 carries for a season-best 120 yards and two scores at Kentucky and logged his third 100-yard rushing game of the season last week against Georgia when he toted the pigskin 24 times for 109 yards. It was his third 100-yard rushing game against the Bulldogs and the 11th of his career, tying Brandon Bennett and Harold Green for second on the school's all-time list.

MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICANS: Three Gamecocks earned their way on *Phil Steele's* Midseason All-America squad. Defensive end **Jadeveon Clowney** was a first-team selection, while offensive center **T.J. Johnson** earned second-team accolades. Junior punt returner **Ace Sanders** earned a spot on the fourth team.

THE UNIFORMS

The Gamecocks will debut custom battle uniforms against LSU.

- ❖ The Battle Gray uniform was inspired by a battleship, taking cues from the color and incorporaing it along with the South Carolina garnet and custom South Carolina camo pattern
- ♦ The camo pattern, which is South Carolina to the core, incorporates the palmetto tree and crescent moon into the design and is a nod of respect to the strong military presence in the state
- The uniform is a fusion of military inspiration and new-school Under Armour innovation and design

THIS BYRD CAN FLY: Dylan Thompson and Damiere Byrd hooked up on a 94-yard touchdown pass against UAB. It was the fourth-longest touchdown pass in school history and the first of Byrd's career. It also ranks as the second longest pass play in the Division I play this season. Byrd has 10 receptions this season for 288 yards, a gaudy 28.8 yards per catch average, with two scores. Byrd also competes in the 60-meter dash for the Carolina track & field squad and competed in an international track meet for the U.S. in Japan.

TRENDING TIGHT ENDS: The Gamecocks have brought the tight end back into vogue. Halfway through the regular season senior **Justice Cunningham** has seven catches this season for 71 yards. He had just 27 receptions for 257 yards from 2009-11. Sophomore **Rory Anderson** has become a big play threat. He has eight catches this season for 157 yards, a 19.6-yard average, with a team-leading four touchdowns. In his brief career, Anderson has seven TDs among his 16 catches with a 21.6-yard per catch average.

ALONG THE O-LINE: The Gamecocks' offensive line has a blend of youth and experience. Senior center T.J. Johnson, a Rimington Award candidate and the reigning SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week, anchors the line. He has started every game over the past four seasons, making 46 career starts. He will match Cliff Matthews for the school record with his 47th start. Redshirt sophomore A.J. Cann has become a fixture at left guard. He started all 13 games last season as a redshirt freshman and has 19 consecutive starts. Junior right quard Ronald Patrick has started all six games this season as the middle of the line has remained intact. The tackle position has been more fluid. True sophomore Mike Matulis (9 starts) started the first four games (two at left tackle and two at right tackle), but has not started the last two games, missing the Kentucky game with a shoulder injury. Redshirt sophomore tackle Cody Gibson has made six career starts, including two this season. Redshirt freshman tackle Brandon Shell made his first career start at Vanderbilt as the left tackle and has gotten the call each of the last two weeks at right tackle. Redshirt sophomore tackle Corey Robinson has been the starting left tackle in each of the last three contests, his first career starts.

THE TOTAL PACKAGE: Carolina ranks third in the SEC and 11th in the nation in total defense, allowing just 278.0 yards per game (83.8 rushing/194.2 passing). The ranking is becoming the norm for the Gamecocks, as they ranked third in both the SEC and the country last season, surrendering just 267.7 yards per game (136.0 rushing/131.7 passing).

NOT ON OUR WATCH: Carolina has surrendered 63 points through the first six games (six touchdowns and seven field goals), ranking second in the SEC and fourth in the country in scoring defense at 10.50 points per game. The Gamecocks have been especially stingy in the first and third quarters, allowing just six points total in each of those stanzas. The Gamecocks have pitched a shutout in at least two quarters in all six games this season. Here are the top teams in scoring defense in 2012:

SACK ATTACK: The Gamecocks racked up a season-high eight sacks in the win at Kentucky, and own 25 sacks on the season, tops in the SEC. Sophomore **Jadeveon Clowney** leads the way with 6.5 sacks and **Chaz Sutton** has added 4.0, while 11 different players have figured into the total. Clowney ranks second in the SEC with both his 6.5 sacks and with 11.5 tackles for loss (9th in the nation).

STRONGMAN COMPETITION: One of the strongest players to ever don the Garnet and Black is fifth-year senior defensive tackle **Byron Jerideau**. Jerideau, a 6-1, 316-pounder from Green Pond, S.C., is a beast in the weight room, logging a 670-pound squat, a 500-pound bench press and has the strength to power clean well above 300 pounds.

SENIOR 'BACKERS: New linebackers coach Kirk Botkin is blessed with a group of experienced players. The two-deep at the Mike, Will and Spur positions features five seniors who have combined for 14 varsity letters. **Reginald Bowens** (14 starts) and **Damario Jeffery** (4 starts) handle the Mike position; **Shaq Wilson** (26 starts) and **Quin Smith** (4 starts) man the Will position; and **DeVonte Holloman** (28 starts) gets the call at the Spur position.

SHAQ ATTACK: Senior linebacker **Shaq Wilson** has been outstanding this season. In addition to his two interceptions, Wilson, the quarterback of the defense, and his backup, **Quin Smith**, are tied for the team lead with 30 tackles.

PICK THIS: The Gamecocks picked off a season-best four passes against ECU and have eight for the season. Linebacker **Shaq Wilson** and Spur **DeVonte Holloman** lead the way with two each, while **Jimmy Legree** returned his for a touchdown against ECU. Last year, the defense logged 19 interceptions with two going for "pick-sixes" (Antonio Allen at Georgia and Devin Taylor at Arkansas). The school record for interceptions in a season is 23, set in 1981 and matched in 1984 and again in 1987.

I SWEAR HE'S BACK: Senior safety **D.J. Swearinger** returned to the Gamecock lineup after sitting out the Missouri game after being suspended by the SEC. Swearinger, considered the biggest hitter of the defense, is a playmaker as well, with 16 tackles, an interception, five pass breakups and a 65-yard fumble return for a touchdown this season. His six passes defended ranks fifth in the SEC.

CALL ME MAYBE: Senior cornerback **Akeem Auguste** returned to action at Kentucky. It was his first active duty since the Georgia game in 2011 and just his second game since the 2010 season. Auguste, who missed all but one game last season with a foot injury while getting a medical redshirt season, missed the first four games this season with a groin injury.

THE PUNTER: Sophomore **Tyler Hull** did not arrive on the Carolina campus until a week after fall camp began, but quickly asserted himself as the team's top punter. The Mount Airy, N.C. product kicked at Guilford (N.C.) College in 2010 before transferring to Surry

Community College. For the season, Hull is averaging 38.8 yards on 23 punts with six inside the 20, 11 fair catches, and three that have traveled 50+ yards. Both Hull and backup punter **Patrick Fish**, wear number 13.

81-52-83-8 HUT, HUT: Fifth-year senior Adam Yates has worn all four of those numbers since spring ball. What the Sparks, Md. product is 3-for-5 on field goals with a long of 38 yards and a perfect 27-for-27 on extra point attempts. The Gamecocks' five field goal attempts are tied with Georgia for the fewest in the SEC. Yates made the biggest kick of his career when he hit a 42-yarder midway through preseason camp, earning a scholarship. He has also assumed the kickoff duties from Landon Ard and has produced 15 touchbacks on 26 kicks.

GIVE US A CHANCE: The Gamecocks were ranked dead last in the country, No. 120, in kickoff returns prior to the Missouri game. But that was no fault of new special teams coach Joe Robinson. The Gamecocks had a 0.0-yard return average because they had not returned a kickoff, the only team of 120 without one through the first three weeks. When Bruce Ellington finally got a chance against Missouri, he returned it 50 yards to midfield, setting up a touchdown. This week, Carolina ranks 19th in the county in kickoff return average of 26.2 yards on its four returns.

WINNING MORE OFTEN: The Gamecocks have posted four-straight winning seasons and a school-record eight-straight seasons of at least a .500 record, surpassing the previous mark of seven-straight seasons of .500 or better set from 1928-34. The Gamecocks went 6-5 in 2004, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 6-6 in 2007, and 7-6 in both 2008 and 2009 before logging a 9-5 record in 2010 and a school-best 11-2 mark in 2011. With six wins already this season, they are in good shape to keep those streaks alive.

AN SEC SIX-PACK: The Gamecocks were 6-2 in the SEC in 2011, recording six SEC wins for first time in school history. They finished the 2000, 2001, 2005 and 2010 seasons with 5-3 SEC marks. The 2011 season marked the ninth time they finished with at least a .500 record in SEC play (4-4 in 1994, 1996, 2004 and 2008). With four SEC wins already this season, 2012 will mark the 10th time they finish with at least a .500 SEC mark in 21 seasons and three in a row for the first time.

GAMECOCKS IN THE SEC: The Gamecocks wrapped up their 20th season of league play in the SEC with a school record six victories. They have played 164 SEC regular season contests since joining the league. Here's a breakdown of the four five-year segments in conference regular season action, prior to 2012:

WORKING OVERTIME: The Gamecocks have played just two overtime games in their history, both at Tennessee. They dropped a 23-20 decision in Knoxville on Sept. 27, 2003, then fell by a 27-24 score on Oct. 27,

2007, at Neyland Stadium. Every other SEC team has played at least four overtime games since the rule was established in 1996.

NEW SHERIFF IN TOWN: The Gamecocks have swept the "Big Three" of the SEC East – Florida, Georgia and Tennessee – in back-to-back seasons. They had never pulled that trifecta in any season prior to 2010. From 1992-2003, Carolina was 5-34 against the "Big Three," going 4-9 against Georgia, 1-12 versus Tennessee and winless in 13 tries against Florida. Since Coach Spurrier took over in 2005, Carolina is 11-11 against those same three teams including a 7-0 mark in the past three seasons. Since 2005, they are 4-3 versus Tennessee, 4-4 against Georgia and 3-4 against Florida.

THE LEGACY CONTINUES: The Carolina roster features four players whose fathers also donned the Garnet & Black: sophomore defensive tackle **Kelcy Quarles** and his father, Buddy (1984-87); redshirt freshmen defensive linemen **Gerald Dixon** and **Gerald Dixon Jr.** and their father, Gerald (1990-91); and freshman **Jordan Diggs** and his father, Shed (1984-87).

CAPTAINS: The Gamecock coaches select game captains each week until the off week in November, at which time the team will select "permanent" captains for the 2012 season. Here are the game-by-game captains:

MR. FOOTBALL: The Gamecocks have signed the last four "Mr. Football" winners in the state of South Carolina: Stephon Gilmore in 2009, followed by Marcus Lattimore in 2010, Jadeveon Clowney in 2011 and Shaq Roland in 2012.

EARNING THEIR KEEP: Steve Spurrier put five former walk-on players on scholarship for the 2012-13 school year. The quintet includes offensive center **Travis Ford**, deep snapper **Walker Inabinet**, defensive back **Jared Shaw**, holder **Seth Strickland** and placekicker **Adam Yates**.

IN THE CLASSROOM: The Gamecocks placed 21 players on the 2011 SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll, while posting a team GPA of 2.704. Those who made the SEC Honor Roll include returnees Jacob Baker, A.J. Cann, Ryland Culbertson, Bruce Ellington, Travis Ford, Walker Inabinet, T.J. Johnson, Nick Jones, Marcus Lattimore, D.L. Moore, Davis Moore, Ronald Patrick, Connor Shaw, Seth Strickland, Dylan Thompson, and Adam Yates. The team posted its highest GPA on record in Spring 2012 with a mark of 2.781. Football notched a single year (2010-11) APR score of 993 and a multiyear score of 966, both program highs.

SPORTING THE SHEEPSKIN: Ten Gamecocks have earned their diplomas. Those who have graduated include Akeem Auguste (sociology), Reginald Bowens (criminal justice), Qua Gilchrist (sociology), Walker Inabinet (sport & entertainment management), T.J. Johnson (sport & entertainment management), Kenny Miles (criminal justice), D.L. Moore (retailing), Seth Strickland (political science), Shaq Wilson (African-American studies) and Adam Yates (international hospitality-tourism management).

RECRUITING SUCCESS: The Gamecocks are coming off another successful February signing day. The Gamecocks have put together eight consecutive classes that rank among the nation's top 25, according to Rivals.com. Here are the Gamecocks' recent recruiting class rankings according to Rivals.com and Scout.com:

PERMANENT OPPONENT: After having the Arkansas Razorbacks serve as Carolina's "permanent" Western Division opponent since joining the SEC in 1992, the Gamecocks will be paired with a new "permanent" opponent beginning in 2013. Carolina and Texas A&M have been paired up, as the conference will use a 6-1-1 format for future conference scheduling. Arkansas will be paired with the Missouri Tigers, while the rest of the league will keep their traditional cross-division rivals.

THEY PAY TO SEE THE GAMECOCKS PLAY:

The Gamecocks averaged 79,131 in their seven home games in the 2011 season, ranking 16th in the country. After four home games this season, Carolina is averaging 80.251 per game, 16th in the country. They established a new school record when 85,199 attended the Georgia game on October 6.

GAMECOCKS AS A RANKED TEAM: Under Steve Spurrier, the Gamecocks have been a ranked team heading into 47 contests. Carolina is 31-16 in those opportunities when appearing in the national rankings.

The Capital One Bowl has the second selection, making its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record. The AT&T Cotton and the Outback Bowls share the third and fourth selections from the SEC. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the fifth selection of preference from the SEC. The Gator Bowl has the sixth selection and the Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl has the seventh pick from the SEC. The AutoZone Liberty and BBVA Compass Bowls share the eighth and ninth selections and the AdvoCare V100 Independence Bowl has the 10th selection.

UP NEXT: The Gamecocks stay on the road in the SEC as they travel to Gainesville for an Eastern Division showdown with the Florida Gators. The Gators lead the all-time series 23-6-3, including a 12-1 advantage in Gainesville. The Gamecocks have won each of the last two contests, including a 36-14 win in their last trip to the Swamp and a 17-12 win in Columbia last season.

Jarrett Lee went 16-of-26 for 189 yards and LSU held South Carolina to minus-7 yards in the fourth quarter as the No. 13 Tigers beat the Gamecocks 24-17 on Saturday night.

LSU (5-1, 3-1 Southeastern Conference) took the lead for good on Charles Scott's 2-yard touchdown run with 4:16 to go. It capped a grinding, 83-yard drive that took more than six minutes off the clock.

Then Curtis Taylor picked off Stephen Garcia two plays later, souring an otherwise remarkable game for the freshman, who accounted for 230 of 254 yards for South Carolina (5-3, 2-3) in his first career start.

The Tigers had a season-best six sacks. The last one ended South Carolina's final drive into LSU territory. LSU held South Carolina to 42 total yards in the second half after allowing two touchdowns in the final 2:28 of the first half.

LSU trailed by a touchdown at half-time and failed to get a first down in its first two drives of the second half. But the Tigers finally got going late in the third quarter as Andrew Hatch, who usually comes in for running plays, rolled right, then threw back to a wide open Ricky Dixon for a 6-yard touchdown that tied the game at 17 with 44 seconds left in the third quarter.

Keiland Williams led LSU with 72 yards on 15 carries, while Scott, the SEC's third-leading rusher, ran for 61 yards on 16 carries. Demetrius Byrd caught three passes for 65 yards.

Garcia was 14-of-26 for 215 yards with a touchdown. He also carried the ball 19 times for 15 yards. The Gamecocks had just 39 yards rushing. Kenny McKinley caught four passes for 77 yards, and tight end Jared Cook had five receptions for 74 yards.

With LSU up 10-3, South Carolina scored two touchdowns in the final 2:28 of the first half. Garcia led the Gamecocks on a four-play drive highlighted by the freshman's 41-yard throw to McKinley and a 26-yard TD pass to tight end Weslye Saunders.

On LSU's next play, Lee threw an interception that Carlos Thomas returned 46 yards to the Tigers 8. Mike Davis then fell into the end zone on fourth-and-1 to give the Gamecocks a 17-10 halftime lead.

The No. 2 Tigers used a fake field goal to score one touchdown and piled up 290 rushing yards to defeat Steve Spurrier and No. 12 South Carolina 28-16.

Midway through the second quarter, the Tigers set up for a field goal attempt from 32 yards. However, the holder, quarterback Matt Flynn flipped the ball over his shoulder to kicker Colt David, who ran it in for a touchdown run and a 21-7 halftime lead.

Jacob Hester's power and Trindon Holliday's speed were key for LSU on the ground and its dominant defense did the rest with two interceptions and a pair of stops on fourth-and-short yardage situations.

The Gamecocks' tandem of standout running backs, Cory Boyd and Mike Davis, combined for only 27 yards and one TD by Davis. Because of sacks, South Carolina's net rushing total was only 17 yards.

Backup quarterback Chris Smelley ended up with the best passing numbers for the Gamecocks, going 12-of-26 for 174 yards and a late 1-yard TD pass to Kenny McKinley.

He was intercepted by Chevis Jackson, while Danny McCray intercepted starter Blake Mitchell to set up a touchdown on a fake field goal late in the first half

Mitchell bounced back from a couple of vicious sacks and, with the help of an LSU facemask penalty, he drove the Gamecocks for a 7-0 lead on their third series, capped by Davis' 1-yard run.

It was only the second score LSU had given up this season, and it was the first time the Tigers trailed in a game.

With the remnants of a tropical depression soaking Tiger Stadium, the field became sloppy and hindered the passing game.

Mitchell bobbled several snaps in shotgun formation and receivers for both teams slipped on cuts.

It was less of a problem for LSU, which subbed in powerful and mobile backup Ryan Perrilloux for designed quarterback runs. The Tigers wound up with 217 yards rushing in the first half, Holliday with 61 and Perrilloux with 54.

There was nothing Spurrier could do, and he watched with increasing frustration as LSU piled up the yards.

Did You Know...

Steve Spurrier is one of only four coaches to record 100 or more wins as an SEC coach against SEC competition (he also has three wins against SEC teams while coaching at Duke). Only Bear Bryant (159) has won more SEC conference games than Coach Spurrier's 120. Spurrier passed John Vaught (106) and Vince Dooley (105) during the 2010 campaign.

Steve Spurrier, who has coached a national championship team, won seven Southeastern Conference titles, garnered nine conference Coach of the Year awards, and won nearly 73 percent of the college games in which he has coached, is beginning his eighth season as head coach at the University of South Carolina. Spurrier was introduced as Carolina's 32nd head coach on Nov. 23, 2004.

Coach Spurrier has compiled a 203-75-2 (.729) won-loss record in 23 seasons as a major college head coach, including a 61-35 mark (.635) at Carolina. He became the 71st collegiate coach (all divisions) and the 22nd in Division I to record 200 career victories when he defeated UAB on Sept. 15, 2012 and logged his 250th all-time coaching win against Georgia on October 6, 2012.

He led the Duke Blue Devils to the 1989 Atlantic Coast Conference championship before returning to his alma mater, the University of Florida, as head coach in 1990. During his 12 seasons with the Gators, Spurrier's teams won seven Southeastern Conference championships, one national title and finished ranked in the nation's top 10 nine times. His record at Florida was an amazing 122-27-1 (.817). Spurrier, who won the 1966 Heisman Trophy as a quarterback for the Gators, was also head coach of the NFL's Washington Redskins (2002-03). He returned to the college ranks in 2005 after a one-year absence from the sidelines.

In his first season at South Carolina, Coach Spurrier led the Gamecocks to a 7-5 record and a second-place finish in the SEC Eastern Division. In doing so, he posted a five-game winning streak, the 15th-consecutive year in which he has had a five-game winning streak, something no other coach in college history has accomplished. He was honored as the SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press after leading the Gamecocks to a school-record five straight SEC wins, their first win ever at Tennessee and their first win over Florida since the 1930s.

He came back with an 8-5 record in 2006, just the ninth time in school history that the Gamecocks posted eight or more wins in a season. The season was capped with a victory in the Liberty Bowl over Conference USA champion Houston. With that win, Spurrier matched Joe Morrison for the most wins by a Carolina head coach in his first two seasons in Columbia.

In his third season with the Garnet & Black, Spurrier's squad raced out to a 6-1 re-

cord and moved as high as No. 6 in the BCS rankings, before finishing the campaign with a 6-6 record. With 21 wins, he set the Carolina record for coaching victories after three seasons at the helm.

With a 7-6 record in 2008, Carolina returned to a New Year's Day bowl game for the first time since the 2001 season. The Gamecocks followed that up with another 7-6 record in 2009, their sixth consecutive nonlosing season, the longest stretch in school history since 1928-34. The 2009 season included a win over No. 4 Ole Miss, only the second time in school history that Carolina has defeated a top-five team.

His 2010 Gamecock squad posted several milestones en route to a 9-5 season, the biggest of which was the school's first SEC Eastern Division title and first appearance in the SEC Championship. The Gamecocks also defeated the nation's No. 1 team, Alabama, for the first time in school history, and finished the season ranked 22nd in both major national polls. He was named SEC Coach of the Year for the seventh time, his ninth overall Coach of the Year honor.

The Gamecocks continued to make history in 2011, winning a school record 11 games and finishing in the the top-10 in the final A.P. poll for the first time ever. The squad also won a school record six SEC games and defeated each of their Eastern Division rivals for the first time ever. Carolina capped the regular season with a win over Clemson, its third-straight over its Palmetto State rival, the first time that has been accomplished since 1968-70, then defeated Nebraska in the Capital One Bowl by a convincing 30-13 margin.

Over the past three seasons, the Gamecocks are a perfect 9-0 against their top rivals, Georgia, Florida, Tennessee and Clemson.

With 61 wins at Carolina, Coach Spurrier is just three victories from matching Rex Enright's school record for 64 career wins.

NASHVILLE, TENN.—Junior running back Marcus Lattimore rushed for 110 yards and two touchdowns to lead ninth-ranked South Carolina to a 17-13 victory over Vanderbilt on Thursday night in the season opener for both teams at Vanderbilt Stadium.

With the Gamecocks trailing 13-10 early in the fourth quarter, Lattimore scored the game-winning touchdown on a 1-yard run with 11:25 remaining. The Gamecock defense then buckled down and allowed just 17 yards the rest of the way to seal the win.

South Carolina (1-0, 1-0 SEC) has now won 13 straight season openers and nine straight games against SEC Eastern Division opponents, while Gamecock head coach

Steve Spurrier improves to 22-1 all-time in season openers. The Commodores (0-1, 0-1) have dropped four straight games to South Carolina.

In his first game back after suffering a knee injury at Mississippi State last season, Lattimore averaged 4.8 yards on 23 carries and led the Gamecocks with three receptions for 21 yards.

Despite missing several series with a shoulder injury, junior quarterback Connor Shaw helped guide the Gamecocks back into the game, connecting on 7-of-11 passes for 67 yards and rushing 14 times for 92 yards.

The Gamecock defense came up big early after two turnovers by the offense. With Vanderbilt facing a third and goal at the Carolina 5, linebacker Shaq Wilson stepped in front of a Jordan Rogers pass and returned the interception 37 yards to the Commodore 49.

Wilson's interception provided a spark for the offense, as Shaw ran for a 20-yard gain on Carolina's first play after the turnover. Lattimore then took care of the rest as he busted loose for a 29-yard touchdown run, breaking a tackle on his way to the end zone. The touchdown moved Lattimore into sole possession of third place in career rushing touchdown at Carolina with 28. Adam Yates tacked on the extra point to give the Gamecocks a 7-0 lead at the 4:55 mark of the first quarter.

Yates drilled his first career field goal attempt from 20 yards out with 11:44 left in the half to push South Carolina's lead to 10-0.

Vanderbilt fought back to tie the game before halftime, as Rogers connected with Jordan Matthews for a 78-yard scoring strike to make it a 10-7 ballgame with 10:37 remaining.

After holding the Gamecocks to a three-and-out on the ensuing possession, the Commodores drove deep into Carolina territory before Carey Spear made a 25-yard field goal to knot the game at 10-10.

Shaw left the game late in the second quarter with a shoulder injury after rushing for a 2-yard gain on first down, as the teams ran out the clock and headed into the locker room tied at 10.

Vanderbilt took its first lead of the contest in the third quarter on a 44-yard field goal by Spear that gave the Commodores a 13-10 advantage with 6:02 on the clock.

But Shaw re-entered the game to help lead the Gamecocks to victory. After the offense stalled in his first series back, he guided Carolina on a nine-play, 66-yard scoring drive in his second series, with Lattimore scoring from 1 yard out to give the Gamecocks the lead for good.

Wilson and sophomore defensive tackle Kelcy Quarles led the Carolina defense with eight tackles apiece, as the Gamecocks surrendered 276 yards. Carolina also had five sacks on the night.

Rogers led the way for Vanderbilt, completing 13-of-23 passes for 214 yards and one touch-down.




COLUMBIA, S.C.—In his first career start, sophomore quarterback Dylan Thompson threw for 330 yards and three touchdowns to lead ninthranked South Carolina to a 48-10 victory over East Carolina in its home opener at Williams-Brice Stadium.

Thompson, who completed 21-of-37 pass attempts, helped South Carolina amass 528 yards of total offense, including 397 through the air.

The Gamecocks (2-0) have won six consecutive contests dating back to last season. The win also gives head coach Steve Spurrier the 199th of his collegiate career.

Junior running back Marcus Lattimore led the Gamecock rushing attack with 40 yards and a touchdown on 13 carries. He is now tied for the school record for career touchdowns with 33



South Carolina had 11 different players with at least one or more receptions. Sophomore Rory Anderson led the way with career highs in receptions (four), receiving yards (90) and touchdowns (two). Sophomores Damiere Byrd and Bruce Ellington added 81 and 63 yards, respectively, while senior D.L. Moore had two receptions for 45 yards and two touchdowns. Junior DeAngelo Smith also had a 30-yard touchdown reception, the first of his career.

Defensively, the Gamecocks surrendered 403 yards but they made big plays for the second consecutive week, forcing five turnovers (four interceptions, one fumble).

Quin Smith, T.J. Gurley and Jimmy Legree led the defensive effort with five tackles apiece. Legree also recorded his first career interception and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown. Seniors D.J. Swearinger and Shaq Wilson and sophomore Brison Williams also came up with one interception each.

ECU starting quarterback Rio Johnson threw for 193 yards but had three interceptions. Backup Shane Carden completed 12-of-18 passes for 140 yards with one touchdown and one interception, while sophomore receiver Justin Hardy hauled in eight passes for 111 yards and a touchdown to lead the Pirates (1-1).

The Gamecocks wasted little time putting points on the scoreboard as they found the end zone less than two minutes into the game. On the fourth play of the contest, Thompson connected with Byrd for a 53-yard pass play to the ECU 6. Lattimore took the handoff on the ensuing play and plowed his way up the middle for a 6-yard touchdown run to give Carolina the early 7-0 lead.

South Carolina pushed its lead to 14-0 late in the first quarter with a five-play, 71-yard scoring drive capped off by a 7-yard touchdown pass from Thompson to Anderson. Ellington and Anderson did a majority of damage on the drive, tallying 40 and 24 receiving yards, respectively.

Thompson delivered his second touchdown strike of the contest early in the second quarter, connecting with Smith in the corner of the end zone from 30 yards out to give the Gamecocks a 21-0 cushion heading into the locker room.

The Carolina defense came up big at the end of the half, forcing turnovers on three of ECU's final four possessions of the second quarter.

The defense kept its momentum going to start the second half, as Wilson stepped in front of a Carden pass at the ECU 29 for his second interception of the season. Three plays later Thompson completed a pass to Moore, who dodged defenders on his way into the end zone for a 29-yard TD to give the Gamecocks a 28-0 lead. On the ensuing possession, Carolina scored again when Legree intercepted a Johnson pass at the ECU 34 and raced into the end zone untouched.

A 23-yard field goal by ECU's Warren Harvey at the 1:44 mark of the third made it 35-3.

The Gamecocks added another touchdown with the help of some trickery, as receiver Ace Sanders caught a lateral and found Moore wide open for a 16-yard touchdown pass early in the fourth quarter, giving South Carolina a 41-3 lead.

After ECU scored its first touchdown on a 34-yard pass from Carden to Hardy, USC capped the scoring with a 51-yard scoring strike from Seth Strickland to Anderson late in the contest.



COLUMBIA, S.C.—No. 8/9 South Carolina amassed 501 yards of total offense en route to a 49-6 victory over UAB on Saturday night at Williams-Brice Stadium, giving head coach Steve Spurrier his 200th career victory as a collegiate head coach.

With the win, the Gamecocks improve to 3-0 and extend their winning streak to seven games dating back to last season, which ties for the second longest streak in school history.

For the second straight week, South Carolina gained more than 500 yards of offense, passing for 322 and rushing for 179. The Gamecocks had to mix up quarterbacks after junior Connor Shaw left the game late in the second quarter with an injury. Shaw completed 8-of-14 passes for 107 yards and a touchdown before leaving



the game. Sophomore Dylan Thompson came in after Shaw's injury and had plenty of success directing the offense, throwing for 177 yards and two scores.

Junior running back Marcus Lattimore rushed for 85 yards on just 12 carries and had one score as he became South Carolina's career leader in touchdowns with 34. He also moved into a tie with George Rogers and Harold Green for first in school history in rushing touchdowns with 31. Freshman Mike Davis contributed 84 yards and a touchdown on just four carries.

Bruce Ellington led the receiving corps with five catches for 98 yards, and Damiere Byrd had a 94-yard touchdown reception. Ace Sanders hauled in four passes for 55 yards and a score, and freshman Shaq Roland added a 30-yard touchdown reception.

Defensively, the Gamecocks were just as impressive as they allowed 267 yards of offense, including just 89 in the second half. Senior linebacker Shaq Wilson tallied a game-high eight tackles. Sophomore Jadeveon Clowney was in the UAB backfield disrupting plays for most of the night, recording seven tackles (3.5 for a loss) and two sacks. Senior D.J. Swearinger added three stops and a 65-yard fumble return for a touchdown.

UAB quarterback Jonathan Perry accounted for most of the Blazers' offense, completing 17-of-34 passes for 219 yards.

The Blazers (0-2) came out strong as Jackie Williams returned the opening kickoff 53 yards to the South Carolina 35. UAB settled for a 33-yard field goal by Ty Long to take a 3-0 lead at the 12:41 mark of the first quarter.

After the Gamecock offense stalled on its first two drives of the game, the Carolina defense provided a spark. On a third and 12 for UAB at the Gamecock 35, Swearinger recovered a Perry fumble in mid-air and raced 65 yards for a touchdown, giving South Carolina a 7-3 lead with 2:17 left in the guarter.

The Gamecock defense came up big again on the ensuing possession, stopping UAB on fourth and 12 from the South Carolina 36. The Gamecocks then went on a nine-play, 64-yard scoring drive capped by a 16-yard touchdown pass from Shaw to Sanders. Adam Yates' extra point gave Carolina a 14-3 lead with 11:15 remaining in the half.

UAB pulled to within 14-6 with a 46-yard field goal by Long with 4:34 on the clock, but South Carolina pushed its lead to 21-6 heading into the locker room, as Lattimore ended a five-play, 37-yard drive with a 2-yard touchdown run with 1:37 left.

South Carolina put the game out of reach early in the third quarter, as Thompson guided the offense down the field on the opening possession of the half. He connected on passes of 11 and 43 yards to Ellington to set the Gamecocks up at the UAB 6 before finishing off the drive himself with a 6-yard touchdown run to push Carolina's lead to 28-6.

After the defense shut down the Blazers on the next two possessions, Thompson completed a 94-yard touchdown pass to Byrd – the fourth longest pass play in school history – at the 7:03 mark of the third quarter to give South Carolina a 35-6 cushion.

The Gamecocks added two more scores in the fourth quarter – a 30-yard touchdown pass from Thompson to Roland and a 3-yard touchdown run by Davis – to build the final margin.

COLUMBIA, **S.C.**—Junior quarterback Connor Shaw threw for 249 yards and two touchdowns and completed a school-record 20 consecutive passes to finish the game as he led No. 7/8 South Carolina to a 31-10 victory over Missouri on Saturday at Williams-Brice Stadium.

Shaw's 20 consecutive completions are tied for the second most in SEC history with Ole Miss' Kent Austin, who had 20 straight against Tennessee in 1982. Shaw's completion percentage of 95.2 is also a school record and ranks second in SEC history behind Tee Martin's (Tennessee) record of 95.8 (23-of-24), which came against South Carolina in 1998.

The Gamecocks (4-0, 2-0 SEC) amassed 396 yards of total offense on

Saturday, with 252 coming through the air and 144 on the ground. Junior running back Marcus Lattimore rushed for 85 yards and two touchdowns, averaging four yards per carry to lead the rushing attack. His first touchdown of the afternoon, a 2-yard run early in the second quarter, moved him past George Rogers (1977-80) and Harold Green (1986-1989) for first all-time in career rushing touchdowns at South Carolina with 32. Shaw added 41 yards on 12 carries.

Lattimore also had a stellar day catching passes out of the backfield, tallying seven receptions for 60 yards. Senior tight end Justice Cunningham added four receptions for 41 yards, and junior receiver Ace Sanders had a 23-yard touchdown reception.

Contributing to the Gamecocks' dominant performance was their play on special teams. Sanders returned six punts for 106 yards, including a long of 49. Sophomore Bruce Ellington also had one kickoff return, Carolina's first of the season, for 50 yards.

Defensively, South Carolina held the Tigers to 255 yards of offense (109 rushing, 146 passing). Quin Smith led the way with a season-high 10 tackles, and Devonte Holloman and Shaq Wilson contributed seven stops each. Jadeveon Clowney added four tackles and 1.5 sacks.

Missouri quarterback James Franklin led the Tigers with 92 yards passing, and running back Kendial Lawrence contributed 67 yards on the ground. Linebacker Will Ebner tallied a gamehigh 14 tackles to carry the Missouri defense.

Special teams played a key role in South Carolina's strong finish to the first half. After a scoreless first quarter, Sanders gave Carolina a much-needed spark early in the second quarter with a lengthy punt return as he weaved his way down the field and broke several tackles for a 49-yard gain to the Missouri 4. Two plays later, Lattimore burst into the end zone from 2 yards out, giving the Gamecocks a 7-0 lead with 11:08 left in the half.

The Gamecock defense then forced a Missouri fumble on the ensuing series, and senior defensive end Devin Taylor fell on the ball at the Tiger 37. Shaw took advantage of the excellent field position as he connected with Nick Jones for a 36-yard pass to the Missouri 1, setting up a 1-yard touchdown run by Lattimore. Adam Yates knocked through the extra point to give the Gamecocks a 14-0 advantage at the 10:14 mark of the second quarter.

The Tigers (2-2, 0-2 SEC) put together their best possession of the half late in the second quarter, driving 76 yards on 12 plays to the Carolina 4. However, the Gamecock defense did not break as it held the Tigers to a 22-yard field goal by Andrew Baggett with 1:20 remaining.

Special teams came through once again for the Gamecocks on the ensuing kickoff, as Ellington fielded the ball in the end zone and broke loose for a 50-yard return, giving the offense a chance to score before the half. Four plays later, Shaw found Sanders open down the sideline for a 23-yard touchdown pass, giving the Gamecocks a 21-3 lead heading into the locker room.

The Gamecocks put the game out of reach late in the third quarter, going on a 10-play, 47-yard scoring drive. Shaw capped the drive with a 13-yard touchdown pass to Rory Anderson, giving Carolina a 28-3 cushion.

Shaw remained in the game early in the fourth quarter and completed a 10-yard pass to Damiere Byrd on his final pass attempt of the day.

Game 5 #6/6 South Carolina 38, Kentucky 17



September 29, 2012 Commonwealth Stadium Lexington, Ky. 49,810



LEXINGTON, KY— Sixth-ranked South Carolina erased a 10-point halftime deficit, scoring 31 second half points, on the way to a 38-17 victory over Kentucky on Saturday night at Commonwealth Stadium. The Gamecocks are 5-0 on the year and 3-0 in the SEC while the loss drops Kentucky to 1-4 overall and 0-2 in the league. It was the Gamecock's ninth-straight win, tying the school record set in 1984.

Junior running back Marcus Lattimore carried 23 times for 120 rushing yards and tallied two touchdowns with junior quarterback Connor Shaw going 15-for-18 in the air for 148 yards and two touchdowns as well as 19 carries for 76 yards on the ground.

Trailing 17-7 at halftime, the Gamecocks scored on their opening possession of the second half to cut the deficit to three. A 14-yard rush to convert a third down followed by an 11-yard rush by Shaw set up a 30-yard touchdown pass to Damiere Byrd.



After the defense forced a three-and-out, the Gamecock offense drove 57 yards on the next drive to regain the lead. Carolina mixed the run and the pass on an eight-play drive that was capped by a 17-yard touchdown run by Kenny Miles, putting Carolina ahead for good at 21-17.

With a four-point advantage heading into the fourth quarter, South Carolina put the game away with two more touchdowns and a field goal. The Gamecocks' longest drive of the season in time of possession, 7:12, was capped by a three-yard touchdown run by Lattimore. It was a 14-play, 81-yard drive that featured 63 rushing yards by Lattimore.

The Gamecocks held a 28-17 lead with the defense continuing its steady play. DeVonte Holloman intercepted the Kentucky quarterback on the next possession with freshman defensive tackle Gerald Dixon Jr. coming up with another interception on the Wildcats' next possession. Dixon Jr.'s interception set up Lattimore's second touchdown of the game, this one from four yards out. Carolina would add a 31-yard field goal by Adam Yates to complete the scoring. After allowing 173 total yards in the first half, the defense delivered in the second half, shutting out the Wildcats on just 70 yards in the final 30 minutes. Carolina's offense was stellar in the second half scoring 31 points and gaining 240 yards, including 184 yards on the ground.

The Gamecocks appeared to be going in for the first score of the game midway through the first quarter on their second drive of the game. With 3rd and goal from the Kentucky 1, the Kentucky defense stood tall and stopped South Carolina on a pair of quarterback sneaks to take over on downs near the goalline.

The Wildcats rode the momentum of their defense putting together a 16-play 94-yard drive before settling for a 22-yard field goal by Craig McIntosh that gave Kentucky a 3-0 lead. Twice, the Wildcats converted a pair of 3rd-and-long conversions on 12-yard rush by Jalen Whitlow and a 24-yard rush from Sanders. A key 20-yard pass completion as well as a 15-yard face mask penalty gave Kentucky the ball deep in Carolina territory. However, the Gamecock defense responded on its own with a goal line stand, forcing McIntosh to kick a first field goal.

South Carolina broke on top in the second quarter going 64 yards to paydirt. Shaw rushed for 11 yards and completed a pair of passes to Marcus Lattimore as well as a 37-yard completion to Rory Anderson that put the Gamecocks into scoring position. Deep into Kentucky territory, Shaw found Ace Sanders for a three-yard touchdown reception giving the Gamecocks a 7-3 lead.

Kentucky answered on its next possession though with a touchdown of its own to regain the lead. Whitlow had a steady dose of rushes and passes before capping the drive with an eight-yard touchdown run. The Wildcats were also aided on the drive by a 15-yard face mask penalty by the Gamecocks that moved Kentucky deep into South Carolina territory.

With a three-point lead, Kentucky held the Gamecock offense to a three and out and blocked Tyler Hull's punt giving the Wildcats the ball on the South Carolina 34-yardline. As Kentucky threatened, the Gamecocks suffered a bad break as a tipped pass by Gamecock defensive back Jimmy Legree landed in the hands of UK wide receiver Daryl Collins as Kentucky made its way into the red zone. Raymond Sanders capped the drive with a 10-yard touchdown run that increased Kentucky's lead to 17-7.

Game 6 #6/6 South Carolina 35, # 5/5 Georgia 7




October 6, 2012 Williams-Brice Stadium Columbia, S.C. 85,199



COLUMBIA, S.C.—Sixth-ranked South Carolina put together one of its most complete efforts of the season on Saturday night against No. 5 Georgia en route to a 35-7 victory in front of a record crowd of 85,199 at Williams-Brice Stadium.

The Gamecocks rolled up 392 yards of offense and held Georgia to a season-low 224 yards of offense. The Bulldogs entered the contest averaging 48.2 points per game and 536 yards per contest.

With the win, South Carolina improves to 6-0 overall and 4-0 in the SEC. The victory is the Gamecocks' 10th straight, which is the longest winning streak in school history, and it's their 12th consecutive over SEC Eastern Division opponents. The win is also head coach Steve Spurrier's 250th career coaching victory (collegiate and pro combined).



Junior quarterback Connor Shaw and junior running back Marcus Lattimore combined for 349 yards of South Carolina's total offense. Shaw completed 6-of-10 passes for 162 yards and two touchdowns through the air and added 78 yards and a score on the ground. Lattimore carried the ball 24 times for 109 yards and a score, giving him his 11th career 100-yard game and third against the Bulldogs.

Defensively, South Carolina limited Georgia quarterback Aaron Murray, as he completed just 11-of-31 passes for 109 yards and threw one interception. The Gamecocks also held Bulldog freshman running back standouts Todd Gurley and Keith Marshall to 39 and 37 yards, respectively. The duo entered the contest averaging a combined 192.8 yards per game.

Sophomore safety Brison Williams led South Carolina's defensive effort with seven tackles and two pass breakups. Sophomore Jadeveon Clowney added four stops, including a sack and two tackles for a loss, and DeVonte Holloman recorded an interception for the only turnover of the game and tallied three tackles.

The Gamecocks fed off of the energy from the record crowd from the start and took the opening possession for a five-play, 76-yard scoring drive. A 42-yard pass from Shaw to Damiere Byrd on the second play of the game set South Carolina up at the Georgia 30-yard line. Three plays later Shaw threw a strike to Bruce Ellington for a 20-yard touchdown pass, giving the Gamecocks a 7-0 lead less than three minutes into the game.

The South Carolina defense kept the momentum going on the ensuing possession, as Kelcy Quarles deflected a Murray pass into the air and Holloman dove under the ball for an interception at the Gamecock 31. The Gamecocks took advantage of the Bulldog miscue, marching 69 yards in 11 plays for a touchdown. Shaw connected with Rory Anderson for a 14-yard scoring strike, giving South Carolina a 14-0 lead at the 6:29 mark of the first quarter.

After the defense forced a three-and-out on the next possession, the Gamecock special teams got involved in the early outburst. On fourth and 8 from the Georgia 30, junior punt returner Ace Sanders fielded a Collin Barber punt at the South Carolina 30 and weaved his way through the punt coverage 70 yards for a touchdown and a 21-0 first quarter lead.

The Bulldogs (5-1, 3-1 SEC) threatened to score late in the second quarter as they went on a 15-play, 80-yard drive to the South Carolina 2. However, the Gamecock defense buckled down at the goal line and stuffed the Bulldogs on fourth and goal to preserve a 21-0 halftime lead.

After stalling on its first drive of the second half, the Gamecocks put the game out of reach with a four-play, 63-yard scoring drive on their second possession. D.L. Moore hauled in a 62-yard pass from Shaw over a Georgia defender to set South Carolina up at the Georgia 1 on the third play of the drive. Lattimore then burst up the middle for a 1-yard touchdown run to give the Gamecocks a 28-0 lead with 10:32 left in the third quarter.

South Carolina added one more score with a 14-play, 89-yard scoring drive that ate up 9 minutes and 28 seconds off the clock. Shaw finished off the drive with a 7-yard touchdown run to push the Gamecocks' lead to 35-0.

Georgia avoided the shutout with a 3-yard touchdown run by Ken Malcome with 1:55 left.
