LSU (7-0, 4-0 SEC) TIGERS

THE GAME: The No. 7/7 University of Alabama football team remains at home for a top-10 matchup in its annual battle with the No. 4/4 LSU Tigers. The game is scheduled for a 7 p.m. CT kickoff on CBS with Verne Lundquist, Gary Danielson and Allie LaForce calling the action. Eli Gold and Phil Savage will handle the radio call on the Crimson Tide Sports Network, with Chris Stewart serving as the sideline reporter. Compass Media will be airing the game nationally, with Gregg Daniels and Dale Hellestrae calling all the action.

RANKINGS: Alabama enters week 10 ranked seventh in both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches Poll. LSU is seeded ahead of the Crimson Tide in the polls, sitting at No. 4 in both. The first College Football Playoff rankings are set to be released Tuesday evening.

LSU: The Tigers come to Tuscaloosa with a perfect 7-0 record, including a 4-0 mark in the SEC. LSU's season opener against McNeese State was canceled due to weather, putting the Bayou Bengals one game behind the rest of the NCAA. The Tigers then traveled to Starkville and left with a 21-19 win over Mississippi State to open conference play. Auburn proved no test for LSU in Baton Rouge, as LSU took down AU, 45-21. The trip to Syracuse the following week saw the Tigers escape with a 34-24 win before returning home to dominate Eastern Michigan, 44-22. A return to home conference play resulted in a 45-24 win over South Carolina followed by a 35-28 victory in a top-10 matchup against Florida. In the most recent matchup, LSU finished off Western Kentucky, 48-20, before using last weekend for the team's first and only bye of 2015. LSU is led by Les Miles, who owns a 110-29 record now in his 11th year in Baton Rouge. The Tigers return 16 starters and 46 lettermen from a season ago, while losing only eight and 25, respectively.

SERIES HISTORY: Alabama and LSU will meet for the 80th time in a series that the Crimson Tide leads, 49-25-5, dating back to the 1895 season. Since 2005, the LSU-Alabama games have been true battles, with seven of those games being decided by seven points or less. During head coach Nick Saban's tenure in Tuscaloosa, six of the nine duels between the two teams have been decided by that same narrow margin, with three of those games going into overtime. Most recently, a stunning last-minute drive in the fourth quarter by Blake Sims produced a game-tying field goal to send the 2014 matchup into overtime. The Crimson Tide would secure the win, 20-13, as Sims found DeAndrew White in the corner of the end zone for a six-yard score to push UA ahead for the win in Baton Rouge.

NEXT GAME: The Crimson Tide will take to the road for a matchup with the No. 24 Mississippi State Bulldogs in Starkville. Alabama holds the series lead, 77-18-3, and has claimed victories in each of the last seven meetings. The most recent matchup came on Nov. 15, 2014, when the top-ranked Bulldogs fell to the Tide in Tuscaloosa, 25-20.

Office: 205-348-2088 e-mail: rwoodruff@ia.ua.edu **ESPN COLLEGE GAMEDAY:** Alabama will be making its 35th (21-13 record) appearance on ESPN's College GameDay when the popular pregame show broadcasts from the Walk of Champions at Bryant-Denny Stadium Saturday prior to the SEC top-10 matchup between the Crimson Tide and LSU Tigers. It will mark Alabama's 26th appearance under head coach Nick Saban (18-7). The 26 appearances in the Saban era are five better than Oregon for the most GameDay appearances since the 2007 season. It will be the eighth time College GameDay has visited Tuscaloosa since Coach Saban arrived in 2007. Alabama owns a 4-3 record in those games with wins over Penn State (2010), LSU (2013), Mississippi State (2014) and Auburn (2014). The Tide fell to Georgia in 2007, LSU in 2011 and Ole Miss in 2015. This Saturday against LSU will be the 12th appearance by College GameDay on Alabama's campus, which is tied for the second most in the ESPN program's history (Ohio State 13; Florida 12; Florida State 11).

FACING OFF WITH THE BEST: Entering the 2015 season, the Crimson Tide was tasked with the toughest schedule in college football, according to ESPN.com's College Football Power Index. SEC teams represented 13 of the 25 toughest schedules in college football, per that same index. Alabama faces off with 10 teams who participated in a bowl game a season ago, joining only three other teams in the nation to face the same gauntlet (Arkansas, Vanderbilt, Virginia). Only 14 teams nationally square off with at least nine opponents who went bowling in 2014.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in only three regular season games without national championship implications. Following the Crimson Tide's 24-21 loss to LSU during the 2010 calendar year, UA was essentially eliminated from the national championship discussion. The final three games of that season mark the only three regular season contests without national championship implications for the Tide in the past eight years (93 of 96 games).

RETURNING SUCCESS: The 2015 Crimson Tide returned 12 starters and 54 letterwinners from its 2014 squad that finished 12-2 as the SEC Western Division and SEC champions. The 2015 team returned seven starters on a veteran defense including Jonathan Allen, Denzel Devall, Eddie Jackson, Cyrus Jones, Reggie Ragland, Jarran Reed and A'Shawn Robinson. The offense welcomed back the staples of its offensive line in center Ryan Kelly and left tackle Cam Robinson.

Second Team Preseason All-America (CBS Sports) Ray Guy Award Watch List FIRST TIME STARTERS: Many new faces have earned a start this season for the Crimson Tide. In the Texas A&M game in College Station, freshman defensive back Ronnie Harrison earned his first career start. Prior to A&M, the Arkansas contest saw freshman nose guard Da'Ron Payne made his first career start. A pair of wideouts made their first career start against ULM, including senior Richard Mullaney and freshman Calvin Ridley. Quarterback Cooper Bateman made his first career start against Ole Miss. In the Middle Tennessee contest, Minkah Fitzpatrick (DB) and Dakota Ball (TE) each made their first career starts. In the season opener with Wisconsin, seven students made their first career start, including three on defense and four on offense. Getting their first career nod on defense were Marlon Humphrey (DB), Darren Lake (DT) and Shaun Dion Hamilton (LB). The offensive starters were made up of Jake Coker (QB), Robert Foster (WR), Dominick Jackson (OL) and Ross Pierschbacher (OT).

BEATING THE BEST: With the win over No. 9 Texas A&M on Oct. 17, Alabama owns a 35-13 (.729) mark against the Associated Press top 25, including a 19-7 (.731) record against AP top-10 teams since 2007. This season, the Tide faces off against seven teams in the AP preseason poll, the most ranked opposition of any team in the nation. Alabama finished 5-2 in 2014 against opponents ranked in the AP top 25 after going 3-2 in 2013 and 5-1 in 2012. The Tide held a 4-1 mark vs. top-25 teams in 2011 and went 5-3 against the AP top 25 in 2010.

THE FRIENDLY CONFINES OF BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM: Alabama has won to 19 of its last 20 games at its home stadium. Prior to the Sept. 19 loss to Ole Miss, the Crimson Tide had not lost a game at home since falling to Texas A&M in 2012. Alabama boasts the fifth-best home winning percentage in the FBS at Bryant-Denny Stadium with an .818 mark (243-53-3) since the stadium opened in 1929. Baylor's McLane Stadium, which opened last season (10-0, 1.000), is the leader while Marshall's Edwards Stadium (.850) and Georgia Southern's Paulson Stadium (.849) rank second and third, respectively. Boise State's home field, Albertsons Stadium, comes in fourth with an .829 winning percentage, just ahead of Alabama.

UNRANKED, NO PROBLEM UNDER SABAN: With the win over an unranked Tennessee team on Oct. 24, Alabama has now defeated 58 consecutive unranked teams under ninth-year head coach Nick Saban. The last loss to an unranked team came against Auburn to close out the 2007 season. The current streak began with a win over Colorado on Dec. 30, 2007, in the Independence Bowl. Under Saban, Alabama holds a 62-3 (58-3 after vacated wins) mark against unranked opponents, including a perfect mark in unranked matchups every season since 2008.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 91 games, the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013 and 12-2 in 2014. Boise State is second with 88 wins while Oregon is third with 85 victories.

NON-OFFENSIVE TDs IN THE SABAN ERA: The Crimson Tide took a school-record three interceptions back for a touchdown against Texas A&M on Oct. 17, first a 33-yard return by Minkah Fitzpatrick, then a return of 93 yards by Eddie Jackson and finally a 55 yard return to seal the victory, once again by Fitzpatrick. The three scores marked the 39th, 40th and 41st non-offensive touchdowns of the Nick Saban era. This season, the Tide has recorded five non-offense touchdowns through only seven games. Prior to last weekend in College Station, UA returned both a blocked punt and an interception for touchdowns against Georgia. Since Saban took over in 2007, the Crimson Tide has garnered 16 interception returns, nine punt returns, five kickoff returns, four fumble returns and four blocked punt returns for a touchdown. Alabama had one non-offensive touchdown in 2014. The Tide had seven non-offensive touchdowns in 2013, including three in the season opener against Virginia Tech, marking the first time the Crimson Tide has done so in a game since Sept. 30, 1995, against Georgia.

SABAN CHASING 200 WINS: Now in his 22nd season as a head coach at the collegiate or NFL level, Nick Saban's next win will mark the 200th victory of his coaching career (not including vacated wins). Saban has accumulated a winning record at every collegiate stop, and has put together his best winning percentage during his time at Alabama (.835, 91-18). Across his four different college jobs, Saban-coached teams have made 17 postseason bowl appearances, won six conference championships and laid claim to four national championships. The Fairmont, W. Va., native began his head coaching career at the University of Toledo, where he led the Rockets to a 9-2 overall record that included a Mid-American Conference championship. He then returned to the collegiate head coaching ranks at Michigan State, where he coached from 1995-99 and went 34-24-1. In 2000, he went to Baton Rouge to coach LSU to a 48-16 mark from 2000-04 that included two SEC championships and one national championship (2003). Saban would move on to the NFL, where he would coach the Miami Dolphins for two seasons before returning to college roots, taking on the head coaching duties at The University of Alabama. Since his time at the Capstone, Saban has led the Crimson Tide to a bowl appearance in his first eight seasons as well as three SEC championships and three national championships.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 737 of the 1,099 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 448-127-8 (.775) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 90-15 (.857) mark under head coach Nick Saban. The Crimson Tide is also ranked in the AP poll for the 124th consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid 1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started four seasons at No. 1 (2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 25 seasons (1991-2015), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches' poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011 and 2012 seasons. The Tide has compiled five UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 & 1979) and four USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011 & 2012) coaches poll national titles.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw seven former UA players selected in the 2015 NFL Draft, including first-round pick Amari Cooper who went fourth overall to the Oakland Raiders, the Tide's highest selection since Trent Richardson went third overall in 2012. Safety Landon Collins was the next to go (33rd, New York Giants) followed by T.J. Yeldon (36th, Jacksonville Jaguars) with both players being selected in the second round. Versatile back Jalston Fowler followed Yeldon, being selected in the fourth round (108th overall) by the Tennessee Titans. Also going in the fourth round was offensive lineman Arie Kouandjio who went 112th overall to the Washington Redskins. The Tide's final pair of draft picks came in the seventh round, with offensive lineman Austin Shepherd going to the Minnesota Vikings at pick 228 and linebacker Xzavier Dickson going at pick 253 to the Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots.

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last five years (37) than any other college in the nation. Fourteen of those picks have been first-round selections and 19 have gone in the first two rounds of the NFL Draft. The list of 37 features four Super Bowl Champions, seven Pro Bowl selections, one All-Pro and one Offensive Rookie of the Year.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past eight seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban has coincided with the Crimson Tide's success in the classroom. The 2015 squad features nine players who already had degrees in hand before the opening kick of the Wisconsin game. Over the past eight seasons (2008-present) Alabama has seen **94 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate)** by players still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after already having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive **11 players earn a master's degree** before stepping foot on the field.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Crimson Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the highlights of the Tide's academic successes under head coach Nick Saban.

- An NCAA-leading seven members of the SEC championship team that participated in the 2015 College Football Playoff Semifinal game had already earned a master's degree.
- For the second consecutive year, Alabama football led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play (22 in 2014; 28 in 2013).
- Alabama's last three national title football teams included 60 players who
 had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation's top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That same team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the 2011 SEC Academic Honor Roll
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- Alabama has led the Southeastern Conference in number of football student-athletes being named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

KELLY'S CLASSROOM SUCCESS: Senior Ryan Kelly has been a staple on the Crimson Tide offensive line for each of his four seasons in Tuscaloosa, but his academic talents are equally impressive. The Tide center graduated last summer with his undergraduate degree in marketing and is currently enrolled in classes working towards his master's degree in the same specialization, which he is scheduled to receive this December. During his undergraduate career he was named to the SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll three times, the SEC Freshman Honor Roll and the Dean's list in both semesters of 2013. Kelly currently holds a 3.75 grade point average in his graduate studies.

CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALIST - RYAN KELLY: Ryan Kelly was selected by the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Football Hall of Fame as a semifinalist for the 2015 William V. Campbell Trophy, which recognizes the best football scholar-athlete in the nation. He is one of 56 semifinalists for the trophy in the FBS division. The NFF will announce 15 finalists on Oct. 29, and each of them will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship with the winner eventually receiving an increased scholarship of \$25,000 on Dec. 8 at the 58th NFF Annual Awards Dinner.

Kelly has excelled on and off the field. The Tide's third-year starter at center completed his undergrad degree in the summer of 2014 and is currently pursuing his master's. An active member in the community, Kelly has also put together numerous hours of service in Tuscaloosa but also at home in West Chester, Ohio.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: What Alabama football does off the field is equally as important as their successes on the field. Last season alone, the Crimson Tide put in 200-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered their time across numerous areas last season including in schools, hospitals and on campus.

ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM NOMINEE - O.J. HOWARD: O.J. Howard was nominated for the 2015 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team. The award is one of the most esteemed off-the-field honors in college football, and recognized an all-time high 197 nominees for the 2015 season. The final roster of 22 award recipients will be unveiled in September.

While at UA, Howard has participated in a wide range of community service activities, both locally and across the state. The junior has spent extensive time working with children as well as the elderly in his two years as a member of the Crimson Tide football team. He regularly visits children's hospitals in Birmingham and also spent time at Children's of New Orleans on the team's two bowl trips the past two seasons. He has also volunteered numerous hours at retirement homes and regularly visits the Tuscaloosa VA hospital.

RAGLAND VOLUNTEERING IN THE COMMUNITY: Senior linebacker Reggie Ragland has dedicated himself to volunteering in the community each of his four seasons, contributing numerous service hours each season. Across his first three years in Tuscaloosa, Ragland has accumulated an impressive list of volunteering opportunities and has gone above and beyond what is asked of Alabama football student-athletes. In all, he has totaled more than 50 hours of community service across double-digit volunteer opportunities that include visits to hospitals, schools and churches. Ragland has also visited veterans numerous times at local VA hospitals.

SENIOR CLASS AWARD NOMINEE - REGGIE RAGLAND: Reggie Ragland was selected as one of 30 candidates for the Senior CLASS Award, presented annually to student-athletes who excel both on and off the field. The award recognizes notable achievements in four areas of excellence: community, classroom, character and competition. Ragland returned to the Capstone in 2015 to complete his degree in consumer affairs, fulfilling a promise he made to his mother that he would earn a degree while at The University of Alabama. He has also stood out not only on the football field, but also in the community where he has put in 50-plus hours of community service.

The acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School, the award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities. The 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot for media, coaches and fans to select the award's winner.

Offense Defense Specialists **ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE:** The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won nine national championships in five different sports and 20 SEC championships in seven different sports.
- Alabama claimed two SEC team titles during the 2014-15 academic year - football and gymnastics.
- The overall cumulative grade point average of UA studentathletes in 2014-15 was 3.031.
- Twelve Crimson Tide teams had cumulative GPAs above 3.0 for 2014-15.
- 114 Alabama student-athletes earned SEC Academic Honor Roll status last year, a total made up of 48 in the Fall of 2014 and 66 in the Winter of 2015.
- Since 2000, UA has produced 103 Academic All-America honors, which ranks third nationally over that span behind only Nebraska (127) and Notre Dame (120). Alabama passed Penn State in 2014-15 (94) with Stanford rounding out the top five at 92.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

VETERAN DEFENSE: The Alabama defense includes seven starters from a season ago. Those seven return 330 total tackles, 40 tackles for loss and nine sacks to this year's team. Of those returning starters, five come from the Tide front seven, including Jonathan Allen who collected 11.5 tackles for a combined loss of 44 yards, both totals that ranked second on the team in 2014. Senior defensive leader and inside linebacker Reggie Ragland returns as well after recording 95 total tackles, 10.5 of which were for a loss, to rank second last year.

FORCING TURNOVERS: In the five games since losing the turnover battle 5-0 and falling to Ole Miss by six points, Alabama has made turned the tide in regards to turnovers. Since the matchup with the Rebels, the Crimson Tide is plus-5 in turnovers, having forced 12 total – 10 interceptions – in those five games. The Crimson Tide has now forced 17 turnovers this season, which is the second most in the SEC and is tied for 19th nationally. Alabama's 12 interceptions rank tied for 11th nationally and first in the SEC.

3-and-OUT: The Alabama defense has totaled 38 three-and-outs in the past five games (7.6 per game) to move the Crimson Tide into third place nationally at 6.25 per game. The Tide has forced a three-and-out on 50-of-119 drives this season (42.0 percent).

D-LINE BATTING PASSES: Alabama's heralded defensive line has found multiple ways of affecting the quarterback eight games into the 2015 season. The Tide's defensive front leads the nation in batted passes with 15 among its defensive ends and nose guards. Quick passing games have hindered Alabama's ability to sack the quarterback, even though UA leads the SEC in sacks with 27 total, or 3.38 per game (T6th nationally). Dalvin Tomlinson (DE) leads the nation among defensive linemen with six pass breakups this season (0.75 per game). Jonathan Allen (DE) is tied for third nationally among defensive linemen with .50 PBUs per game (four total). Jarran Reed (DE) has two while A'Shawn Robinson (DE), Da'Ron Payne (DE) and Darren Lake (NG) have one each. Add rush ends (OLBs) Denzel Devall (2) and Tim Williams (1) and Alabama's pass breakups among players with their hand in the dirt swells to 17.

GETTING TO THE QUARTERBACK: Alabama's front seven has made their presence known to the opposing quarterback on a regular basis in 2015. The Crimson Tide is tied for sixth nationally and lead the SEC in sacks with 3.38 per game (27 in eight games). The 3.38 sacks per game is higher than any Alabama team during the Saban era and the 27 sacks passes the season total of 22 from 2013. The Tide has 22 sacks in the last five games (4.40 per game). Defensive end Jonathan Allen leads the way for the Crimson Tide with 6.0 sacks (two against Wisconsin and two at Texas A&M). Including Allen, eight different Alabama defenders have at least two sacks this season, including OLB Tim Williams (3.5), DE Da'Shawn Hand (2.5), LB Ryan Anderson (2.0), OLB Rashaan Evans (2.0), DB Minkah Fitzpatrick (2.0), DL D.J. Pettway (2.0) and LB Reggie Ragland (2.0).

LEADING THE NATION IN SHUTOUTS: The Alabama defense has shut out its opponents 16 times since the start of the 2008 season. More recently, the Crimson Tide defense has shut out 13 teams in the past five seasons, a total that leads the nation. The Tide recorded its first shutout of the 2015 season at home against Louisiana-Monroe on Sept. 28, blanking the Warhawks and limiting the ULM offense to 92 total yards by day's end.

10 POINTS OR FEWER: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide has held opponents to 10 points or fewer 54 times since the start of the 2007 season, most recently in the 38-10 win over Georgia in Athens. The Tide notched a 34-0 shutout win over the ULM Warhawks on Sept. 26, and Prior to that contest, Alabama limited Middle Tennessee to 10 points in the Tide's 37-10 win over the Blue Raiders on Sept. 12. Last year, Alabama shut out two opponents, including Texas A&M on Oct. 18. Alabama held 9-of-13 opponents to 10 points or less in 2013 with three shutouts. Seven opponents were limited to 10 points or less in 2012, four of which were shutouts. Alabama was successful in holding opponents in the 0-10 point range in nine games in 2011 and eight times in 2010. UA kept opponents within that range seven times in both 2008 and 2009, and in 2007 posted two games in which it held opponents to 0-10 points. Alabama has shut out the opposition 16 times during the Saban era.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no defense has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama's defense, led by coordinator Kirby Smart and head coach Nick Saban, has surrendered only 132 touchdowns over the last 88 games. That is 40 fewer than the second most in the nation (LSU with 172).

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: On Oct. 10, Alabama limited Arkansas to 220 yards of total offense, the fifth time the Tide has kept a team under 300 in 2015. UA held Georgia to 299 yards, ULM to 92 yards of offense and also limited Middle Tennessee to 275 yards of offense, one week after holding Wisconsin to 268 yards of total offense in the season opener. In head coach Nick Saban's 116-game tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide has limited opponents to under 300 yards of total offense 71 times, or 61.2 percent of the time. UA held six of its 14 opponents below 300 yards last season.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: During head coach Nick Saban's last 102 games at the Capstone (since the start of the 2008 season), the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposing offense to fewer than 200 yards of total offense 33 times, most recently against ULM on Sept. 26. The Tide accomplished the feat twice last season, including against Texas A&M on Oct. 18 and versus Florida Atlantic in a weather-shortened contest to open the home schedule on Sept. 6. Alabama limited opponents to 200 or less four times in 2013. In 2012, UA did so five times, and in 2011, the Tide accomplished the feat eight times, limiting Kent State to 90 yards and LSU to only 92 yards in the BCS Championship Game (the second and third times a Saban defense had limited its opponent to less than 100 yards of total offense). Alabama's best came in 2009 when the Tide held Chattanooga to 84 yards of total offense. UA held opponents under 200 yards three times in 2010, four times in 2009 and six times in 2008.

HARD TO RUN ON: Alabama's run defense is once again near the top in the nation. The Crimson Tide rank third nationally and first in the SEC, surrendering just 78.5 yards per game after facing some of the best ground games in the nation (Wisconsin, Georgia, Arkansas, Tennessee). The Tide is allowing just 2.60 yards per carry. Alabama has held all eight teams in 2015 at least 69 yards below their season rushing average. The Tide held Wisconsin to 280 yards below their 2014 rushing yards average and then Middle Tennessee (156 yards), Ole Miss (185 yards), ULM (115 yards), Georgia (69 yards), Arkansas (160 yards), Texas A&M (156 yards) and then Tennessee (90) below their 2015 averages entering each game. In all, Alabama has held its eight opponents to an average of 151.4 yards per game below their average entering the game.

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Running the ball is no easy task against the Alabama defense with the Tide yielding only four rushing scores this season. The Tide has limited opposing backs to just 18 rushes of 10 yards or more, ranking near the top nationally. In the last outing, the Crimson Tide allowed 132 yards rushing on 39 attempts by Tennessee. On Oct. 17, Texas A&M was held to 32 yards on 25 carries with the Aggies leading rusher finishing with 48 yards on 13 carries. Alabama held Arkansas to 44 yards rushing on 25 carries with the leading rusher collecting only 26 yards. On Sept. 26 against ULM, Alabama limited the Warhawks only nine yards on 31 attempts. Prior to that, on Sept. 12, the Crimson Tide held Middle Tennessee to 86 rushing yards on 31 attempts a week after stifling a potent Wisconsin rushing attack in the AdvoCare Classic, allowing only 40 total yards to the Badger rushers on 21 carries. The Crimson Tide continued the trend from a season ago, where the defense allowed only five rushing touchdowns in 14 games, the fewest in the nation (UCF was second with nine). The Tide lead the nation in allowing the fewest rushing touchdowns since the start of the 2005 season, surrendering only 75. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 59 rushing touchdowns. Ohio State is No. 2 in that category, giving up 93 since 2007.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 16 individual 100-yard rushing games dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that leads the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival, the Tide has allowed only 11 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game: Georgia's Nick Chubb (146 on Oct. 3, 2015), Ohio State's Ezekiel Elliot (230 on Jan. 1, 2015), Auburn's Tre Mason (164 on Nov. 30, 2013), Virginia Tech's Trey Edmunds (132 on Aug. 31, 2013), Georgia's Todd Gurley (122 yards on Dec. 1, 2012), LSU's Jeremy Hill (107 on Nov. 3, 2012), Georgia Southern's Dominique Swope (153 on Nov. 19, 2011), Tennessee's Tauren Poole (117 on Oct. 23, 2010), Ole Miss's BenJarvus Green-Ellis (131 on Oct. 13, 2007), Houston's Anthony Alridge (100 on Oct. 6, 2007) and Darren McFadden of Arkansas (195 on Sept. 15, 2007).

JACKSON NAMED THORPE AWARD SEMIFINALIST: First year safety Eddie Jackson was named to the list of 16 semifinalists for the prestigious Jim Thorpe Award, recognizing the nation's best defensive back. The junior defensive back has turned in an already impressive season through only eight games, setting team highs in interceptions (5) and return yards (230). Two of his five picks have been returned for touchdowns, while his 230 return yards are an Alabama single-season record, shattering the previous mark of 163 by Hootie Ingram from 1952.

RAGLAND LEADING THE TIDE D: Senior linebacker Reggie Ragland has been a force on the defense. The Tide's captain in the middle has a team-leading 71 tackles, including 5.0 for a loss (-18 yards), to go with three pass breakups, three quarterback hurries, two sacks (-8 yards) and two forced fumbles. In six of the eight games during the 2015 season, Ragland has led the Alabama defense in stops, including a season-high 12 tackles in the win against Tennessee last weekend. He's had nine tackles twice this season, first against Ole Miss and again at Texas A&M. Against the Aggies, he helped stifle a potent A&M offensive attack, notching nine total stops (eight solo), one sack (-5 yards) and 1.5 tackles for a loss (-8 yards) to mark the ninth time for his career that Ragland has led the Tide in tackles. He also tied for the team lead against Georgia with eight stops and backed that up with another eight tackles in the win over Arkansas. His other four team-leading games came a season ago when the linebacker stepped up for the Crimson Tide and finished second on the team with 95 total tackles while accounting for 10.5 tackles for loss (-27 yards), 1.5 sacks (-12 yards), one interception, three pass breakups, three fumble recoveries, one forced fumble and a quarterback hurry.

FOSTER SETS CAREER MARK FOR TACKLES AGAINST UT: Junior linebacker Reuben Foster set a career high for tackles in the Oct. 24 matchup against Tennessee with 11 total. His previous career high was seven, which he recorded in the 2014 season opener against West Virginia. Foster has been a force on defense this year in the starting role, ranking third on the team in tackles with 39. He has added five tackles for a loss (-15 yards), one sack (-6 yards) and five pass breakups to his team totals as well.

JACKSON EXCELLING IN NEW ROLE: Junior strong safety has excelled at his new position this season. Formerly a cornerback, Jackson was moved to the safety position starting in 2015. Since the move, he has collected a team-leading five interceptions through eight games, eclipsing his previous career total of two through 18 games. Jackson has added 230 yards on the picks, including two touchdowns for scores against Georgia on a 51-yard return for six and most recently at Texas A&M for 93 yards. His 230 yards on five picks this season are also the UA record for return yards in a season. The previous high was 163 by Hootie Ingram in 1952 on 10 interceptions. Jackson leads the nation in return yards, is tied for the national lead in returns for touchdowns, and is tied for fifth in total interceptions. He is currently sixth on the team in tackles with 27, while adding two pass breakups and one fumble recovery.

CONSISTENCY THE KEY FOR REED: Senior lineman Jarran Reed has been a force along the defensive front. He currently ranks second on the team in stops with 39, and has added 3.5 tackles for loss (-7 yards), one sack (-3 yards), five quarterback hurries, two pass breakups and one fumble recovery. In the Georgia game, he tied for the team lead in tackles with eight, a season-high total for the starter. Reed had five or more tackles in the first five games of this season and then most recently against Tennessee. The senior and is averaging 4.9 stops per game.

PICK SIXES: Alabama set a school record for interception returns on Oct. 17 at Texas A&M with three interception returns for touchdowns (the Tide had four picks in the game). Freshman nickelback Minkah Fitzpatrick also set the school record with two interception returns for touchdowns himself. Following the matchup in College Station, the Crimson Tide had returned 4-of-12 interceptions for scores, matching the most an Alabama team has had under Saban.

207 INTERCEPTION RETURN YARDS IN COLLEGE STATION:

The Crimson Tide's 207 interception return yards against Texas A&M on Oct. 17 is an Alabama single-game record. The return yards also ranked as the third-most in Southeastern Conference history and the most since 1971 when Tennessee had 214 against South Carolina.

FITZPATRICK'S TWO INT RETURNS FOR TDs VS. A&M: Freshman cornerback Minkah Fitzpatrick returned two interceptions for touchdowns against Texas A&M, going 33 and 55 yards for scores. Fitzpatrick is the only play in Alabama history (via records verified back to 1948) to return two interceptions for scores in the same game. His 88 yards also ranked tied for seventh in Alabama single-game history.

JACKSON SETS UA MARK FOR INT RETURN YARDS AT A&M: Eddie Jackson's 119 return yards on interceptions against Texas A&M on Oct. 17 is the most yards in a single game by an Alabama defender. The previous record high was 98 by Mark McMillian against Chattanooga on Oct. 5, 1991.

THIRD-LONGEST PICK-SIX IN ALABAMA HISTORY: Eddie Jackson's 93-yard pick-six in the second quarter of the Texas A&M game was the third-longest interception return in Alabama history. Jackson returned three interceptions for a total of 230 yards through the first seven games, setting a Crimson Tide record for interception return yards in a season. It broke a 63-year-old record set in 1952 by Hootie Ingram, who registered 163 yards across 10 total picks for the season.

FITZPATRICK EARNS FOUR HONORS FOLLOWING A&M:

Freehman defensive back Minkah Eitzpatrick was named the

Freshman defensive back Minkah Fitzpatrick was named the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week and the Southeastern Conference's Freshman of the Week on Monday following his standout performance at Texas A&M on Oct. 17. He then shared the FWAA National Defensive Player of the Week honors with teammate Eddie Jackson and closed out his week earning honorable mention accolades for the Jim Thorpe Award Player of the Week on Wednesday. The first-year starter returned two interceptions for touchdowns against the Aggies, going for 33 and 55 yards on the scores. The two pick-sixes marked the first time in Alabama history (via records verified back to 1948) that two interceptions were returned for touchdowns by the same player. He also finished with two solo tackles and helped limited A&M to only 316 yards of total offense, 164 yards below their season average.

TIDE BACKS SHARE FWAA DEFENSIVE POTW HONORS:

Alabama defensive backs Eddie Jackson and Minkah Fitzpatrick were named the AutoNation FWAA National Defensive Players of the Week for their performance against Texas A&M on Oct. 17. Combined, the two Tide defenders snagged four interceptions, three of which went for touchdowns, and accumulated 207 return yards on the picks. Fitzpatrick's two returns for scores came from 33 and 55 yards, while Jackson's pick-six was a 93-yard score, the third-longest interception return in UA history. The combined yardage total for the duo was an Alabama single-game record and was the third-highest total in SEC history, while Jackson's 119 return yards in the game were the most in a single-game in Crimson Tide history.

PAIR OF WEEKLY AWARDS FOR RAGLAND vs. ARKANSAS:

Alabama senior linebacker Reggie Ragland was named the Southeastern Conference's Defensive Player of the Week on Oct. 12 and then earned Bednarik Award National Defensive Player of the Week honors following the 27-14 win over Arkansas. He led the Alabama defense in tackles with eight total, including seven solo stops, while helping limit the Razorbacks to 220 yards of offense, more than 250 yards below their season average. He added a sack, forced fumble, pass breakup and two quarterback hurries on the night. The SEC award was the first conference honor of Ragland's career.

REED ADDED TO BEDNARIK AWARD WATCH LIST: Senior defensive end Jarran Reed was added to the Bednarik Award Watch List on Thursday, Oct. 15. The Bednarik Award recognizes the defensive player of the year in college football. Reed was also named to the Outland Trophy Watch List (top interior lineman) entering the 2015 season after a standout junior campaign that saw him finish with 55 tackles, including 6.5 for a loss (-14 yards), one sack and five pass breakups.

DEFENSE SETS SEASON HIGH FOR SACKS VS. ULM: The Crimson Tide defense notched six total sacks against ULM, led by sophomore Da'Shawn Hand's 1.5 sacks for -4 yards. The six sacks were the most the Alabama defense has recorded since last season when UA notched six against Texas A&M. Alabama had four of its six sacks in the first half against the Warhawks, to eclipse the previous single-game season-high of three that the defense accumulated against Wisconsin.

TIDE FORCING TURNOVERS VS. MTSU: Alabama forced four total turnovers on Sept. 12 against Middle Tennessee, with three coming in the first half – two fumble recoveries and one interception, and the final coming by way of the fumble once again in the second half. Prior to that, the last time the Crimson Tide forced at least four turnovers in a game was on Sept. 15, 2012, when the Tide forced three fumbles and two interception against Arkansas. In the week prior to the trip to Fayetteville, Alabama forced four turnovers against Western Kentucky including three fumbles and one interception.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

FIRST HALF POINTS: With Derrick Henry's 20-yard touchdown run for a score on Alabama's first offensive drive of the day last weekend versus Tennessee, the Crimson Tide has scored in the first half of its last 111 games, the longest streak in the nation. The last time UA failed to score in the first half was on Sept. 29, 2007, when Alabama and Florida State headed into halftime in a scoreless tie. The Seminoles won that game, 21-14. Alabama has a 95-16 record during the streak.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: With a 20-yard touchdown run by Derrick Henry on the Crimson Tide's first offensive drive of the Tennessee game, Alabama has now scored in 191 consecutive games – the longest streak in program history.

RUSHING TO SUCCESS: Alabama is 73-4 since the start of the 2008 season when rushing for at least 140 yards. The only losses were at Auburn in 2013, Ole Miss and Ohio State in 2014, and Ole Miss in 2015.

BALL PROTECTION: In its past 102 games, the Tide has turned the ball over only 124 times (68 fumbles, 56 interceptions) for 1.23 turnovers per game. Since 2009, that mark is even better as the Tide has turned the ball over only 105 times in 89 games (1.18/gm). Since 2009, UA starting quarterbacks have thrown an impressively low 43 interceptions in 2,422 attempts (1 INT every 57.3 attempts). Dating back to the 2009 season, the top two running backs in the rotation have lost a fumble only 18 times. Over that 103-game span, the Tide's top two running backs have recorded 2,604 touches, losing a fumble once every 144.7 touches.

ALABAMA BACKS MOVING UP IN THE RECORD BOOKS: Both Derrick Henry and Kenyan Drake continued their rise up the career rushing list against Tennessee. In last Saturday's matchup with Tennessee, Henry rushed for 143 yards and has now amassed 2 416 yards for his career to rank 12th in Alabama history Drake

2,416 yards for his career to rank 12th in Alabama history. Drake collected 10 yards against the Vols, placing him at 36th on the UA all-time rushing list with 1,352 yards.

NATIONALLY RANKED: Derrick Henry moved into the top 10 nationally in rushing yards after his 236-yard performance at No. 8 Texas A&M and remained there after a two-score, 143-yard performance last weekend against Tennessee. He is now ninth nationally with 1,044 rushing yards this season and tied for third in rushing touchdowns with 14. Henry also ranks 12th in rushing yards per game with 130.5.

DERRICK HENRY VS. RANKED TEAMS: Derrick Henry is off to an impressive start this season, but his play against the four best teams Alabama has faced -- #20 Wisconsin, #15 Ole Miss, #8 Georgia and #9 Texas A&M – has been even better. Henry is rushing 164.5 yards per game (658 yards) against ranked teams, with all four games over 125 yards and one over 200 yards (236 at A&M). He has 94 carries against ranked teams for a 7.0 yards per carry average and seven touchdowns.

HENRY REACHING THE END ZONE CONSISTENTLY: With his 20-yard run for a score on the Tide's first offensive drive of the game against Tennessee, Derrick Henry recorded his 13th straight game with a touchdown. The 13-game streak with at least one rushing touchdown is currently the longest active streak in the nation and is one game short of tying Tim Tebow's streak of 14 games with a rushing score that the Florida quarterback put together from 2006-07. Henry continued to build on the Alabama record that he set two weeks ago, which was previously held by Terry Davis. Davis' streak spanned two seasons, from Nov. 6, 1971-Oct. 21, 1972. The last time Henry failed to notch a score was in the LSU game last season on Nov. 8.

HENRY PASSING THE CENTURY MARK: Derrick Henry's 143-yard performance against Tennessee pushed him past the century mark for the 10th time in his career, and the fifth 100-plus performance this season. The 10 games for 100 or more ranks him eight in Alabama history. He went for a career-high 236 yards at Texas A&M, 148 at Georgia on Oct. 3, 127 against Ole Miss and 147 yards with three touchdowns against Wisconsin to open the 2015 campaign. Henry had a 141-yard performance against Missouri in the SEC Championship Game last season. He also went for 111 on 20 carries with a score against Florida and 113 on 17 carries with a touchdown against West Virginia in 2014. As a freshman, Henry produced a Sugar Bowl game against Oklahoma that saw the first-year back go for 100 yards on eight attempts with a touchdown, while also collecting 111 yards on six carries with a score against Arkansas.

HENRY STANDING OUT AS A STARTER: Junior Derrick Henry earned the starting nod at tailback in this season's opener and has filled that role every game since. With 143 yards rushing versus Tennessee last Saturday, in 10 games as a starter junior running back Derrick Henry has rushed for 1,246 yards on 205 carries (6.08 yards per carry) with 16 touchdowns. Prior to 2015, Henry started just two games - Western Carolina and Ohio State in 2014 - but in those 10 combined starts, he has proven to be worthy. He has collected at least one rushing touchdown in each start, and has notched double-digit scoring days five times. Through the air, he has hauled in 11 passes for 132 yards (12.0 yards per catch) with one receiving score.

HENRY FINDING PAYDIRT: Junior running back Derrick Henry enters the 10th week of the season tied for third nationally in rushing touchdowns with 14. He found the end zone three times in both of the first two games to set career highs while adding two touchdowns against Texas A&M and Tennessee, and one score apiece in the Ole Miss, ULM, Georgia and Arkansas games. He went off in College Station with a record-setting performance against A&M, notching the Tide's only two offensive scores on rushes as part of his 236 yards on the ground. Henry ranks ninth nationally and second in the SEC in rushing yards (1,044) while ranking 12th in the nation and second in the conference in rushing yards per game (130.5).

JAKE COKER IMPROVING EVERY WEEK: Senior quarterback Jake Coker's toughness has been on display several times in recent weeks and his efforts with his feet (and shoulder) have converted several first downs for the Crimson Tide. While his feet and toughness have gotten him attention, his quiet command of the Tide offense has helped win games. Over the past four games, Coker is completing 74.3 percent of his passes for 837 yards and three touchdowns.

DRAKE RETURNS WITH RESULTS FOR TIDE: Senior tailback Kenyan Drake has made a significant impact on the Crimson Tide offense this season after returning from a lower leg injury suffered a season ago against Ole Miss. Drake has been a weapon in all facets of the game including running the ball, catching passes and returning kicks. This season, the fourth-year back has amassed 265 yards and a touchdown on 58 carries (4.6 ypc) while adding 16 catches for 181 yards and a touchdown in the passing-game for 11.3 yards per reception to rank second on the team. He also leads the team with 10 total kick returns for 232 yards and a 23.2 average per return. In his first game back this season against Wisconsin, Drake finished the evening with 79 yards on 10 carries, including a long rush of 43 yards that ended in the Tide end zone. The 43-yard dash was the senior's longest run since he rushed for a 46-yard score against Arkansas in 2013.

HOWARD RECORDS CAREER-HIGH RECEPTIONS: Crimson Tide junior tight end O.J. Howard set a career high for receptions against Tennessee with seven catches. His previous mark for receptions in a game was four, which he accomplished two other times, with the most recent coming against Ole Miss this season. A reliable option for the Alabama offense, Howard has hauled in 26 receptions for 290 yards to average 11.2 yards per catch.

HENRY NAMED SEC OFFENSIVE POTW AFTER A&M: Junior running back Derrick Henry was selected as Southeastern Conference's Offensive Player of the Week following his performance at Texas A&M on Oct. 17. Henry set career-highs for rushing yards (236) and carries (32) in the Tide's 41-23 win in College Station. He added two scores and one reception for 18 yards to account for 64.1 percent of the Crimson Tide's offensive yards by day's end. The score extended his school-record for games with a touchdown to 12 total, which also leads the nation. His 236 yards on the ground marked the fifth-highest single-game rushing total in Alabama school history.

RIDLEY SETS CAREER-HIGHS, AGAIN: Freshman wideout Calvin Ridley finished the Oct. 10 Arkansas game with nine catches for 140 yards, both career-high marks for the first-year player. A week prior against Georgia, the freshman totaled 120 yards in Athens to set his high mark, and he previously reeled in a high of six against Ole Miss on Sept. 19. The 81-yard reception was also the longest of Ridley's young career. In his last two outings, Ridley has notched 14 receptions for 260 yards and two scores. Proving to be a bigplay threat, he has three receptions of 45 yards or more. He set his career-high with a 45-yard catch and score and followed that with a 50-yard reception in the Georgia game, before topping both marks with his 81-yard play against Arkansas.

RIDLEY RECEPTION vs. ARKANSAS RANKS ALL-TIME: The 81-yard touchdown reception from Jake Coker to Calvin Ridley in last weekend's Arkansas game ranked in Alabama football history. The play was the second-longest touchdown reception by a freshman, falling behind only Pierre Goode's 90 yard reception from Jeff Dunn against Tennessee in 1987. The catch was also the 11th-longest reception in Alabama history. The play was the longest since a connection of 87 yards from Blake Sims to Kenyan Drake a season ago against Florida on Sept. 20, 2014. The pass-and-catch was also the longest play for the Crimson Tide in the season, longest reception of Ridley's career and longest completion of Coker's career.

TIDE COLLECTS TWO WEEKLY SEC HONORS: Alabama notched two weekly awards from the Southeastern Conference following the Georgia game on Oct. 3. Junior running back Derrick Henry was named Offensive Player of the Week, while first-year wideout Calvin Ridley earned Freshman of the Week honors from the league offices. Henry finished the game in Athens with 148 yards on 26 carries, both career highs, while adding one score to earn his second weekly honor from the league office through the first five games. Ridley had his best game as a member of the Tide, collecting 120 yards on five catches with one score to become the first freshman to pass the century mark for receiving yards since Amari Cooper did so in the 2013 BCS National Championship against Notre Dame.

CAREER HIGHS VS. UGA FOR HENRY: Derrick Henry had a career-game on Oct. 3 in Athens, setting all new highs for himself. He finished the matchup with the Bulldogs running 26 times for 148 yards, both career-highs for the junior tailback, while adding one score. His previous high rush total was 23 against Ole Miss while his high yardage mark was 147 against Wisconsin, both in the 2015 season. He produced back-to-back three-touchdown performances to set, and then tie, his career high in consecutive weeks to begin his junior campaign. His three touchdowns in the matchup with Wisconsin marked his career high. His previous high total was two, which he had accomplished three times and most recently against Missouri in the 2014 SEC Championship Game. The junior also recorded 147 yards by night's end of the AdvoCare Classic, eclipsing his previous high of 141 that he produced in that same championship game against Missouri. He followed his season-opening performance with another three touchdown game against Middle Tennessee to match his career high, while adding 96 total yards.

DRAKE SELECTED TO HORNUNG HONOR ROLL: Senior Kenyan Drake was selected to the Paul Hornung Award Honor Roll in recognition of his efforts against Middle Tennessee on Sept. 12. The Tide back produced 202 all-purpose yards, including career highs in yards and receptions. He finished the home opener with five receptions for 91 yards and a touchdown, while adding six carries for 40 yards and three kickoff returns for 71 yards. Drake's longest return went for 40 yards, and his 69-yard reception helped put Alabama in position to score its third touchdown of the day. Each year, the Hornung Award recognizes the most versatile player in major college football.

HENRY NOTCHES THREE WEEKLY AWARDS: Thanks to his career day against the Wisconsin Badgers on Sept. 5, junior running back Derrick Henry was named the SEC Offensive Player of the Week, the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Offensive Player of the Week and the Maxwell Award (top running back) Player of the Week. In the season opener, Henry rushed for 147 yards on only 13 carries (11.3 ypc) with three total touchdowns, all career marks for the third-year back. He also had four rushes of 10 or more yards while accounting for five first downs. The conference honor was the first of his career.

OFFENSIVE LINE EARNS NATIONAL ACCLAIM: The Alabama offense produced 502 yards of total offense, including 34 points and 27 first downs in the season opener against Wisconsin. A main reason for the offensive output was the standout performance by the Crimson Tide offensive line, which earned itself a spot on the Joe Moore Award Honor Roll. Each week, the award recognizes and promotes top-performing units across the country based on six criteria: toughness, effort, teamwork, physicality, tone setting and finishing.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

SCOTT NAMED SEC SPECIAL TEAMS POTW FOLLOWING UT:

Alabama's sophomore punter JK Scott earned Southeastern Conference Special Teams Player of the Week honors following his performance against Tennessee on Oct. 24. The second-year punter put together four punts for 199 total yards in the Tide's 19-14 win over the Vols. He averaged 49.8 yards per punt, but more importantly netted 44.0 yards on those four kicks. Scott had two punts travel over 55 yards and twice pinned the ball inside the UT 10-yard line to help flip the field for the Crimson Tide in a game of field position.

SCOTT FINDING HIS RHYTHM: Sophomore punter JK Scott has found his rhythm in recent weeks. He is averaging 49.0 yards per punt over the past three games. He punted four times for 199 yards with a long of 56 against Tennessee and four times for 200 yards against Arkansas with two inside the 20-yard line for a 50.0 yards per punt average and a season-long of 58 yards. At Texas A&M, he averaged 48.2 yards on eight punts (386 yards) with a long of 56 yards. Scott's season average has climbed to 43.3 yards per game to rank fifth in the SEC.

A NEW JONES RETURNS THE PUNTS: With the departure of veteran punt returner Christion Jones, senior defensive back Cyrus Jones stepped in to fill that void. In eight games this season, Cyrus has returned 23 punts for 196 yards with a long return of 27 yards against Arkansas. Prior to this season, he had returned 12 total punts for 143 yards with a long return of 70 yards that came last season against Florida Atlantic. Jones returned a career-high five punts twice this season, first against ULM on Sept. 26 and then against Georgia on Oct. 10. His four returns in the season opener against Wisconsin tied his previous career high, which he also collected against Tennessee as a freshman in 2012.

SCOTT BOOTS SEASON-LONG PUNT VS. HOGS: Sophomore punter JK Scott punted a season-high 58-yard boot in the Tide's most recent game against Arkansas. The punt one-upped his previous kick on the day that went for 55 yards to eclipse his season high of 54 entering that game, which he notched the week prior at Georgia.

TIDE BLOCKS PUNT FOR A SCORE AT UGA: Freshman defensive back Minkah Fitzpatrick blocked a Georgia punt and recovered the ball for a touchdown to give Alabama its first blocked punt return for a touchdown since Sept. 21, 2013, against Colorado State. In that game, Kenyan Drake blocked a Rams punt and Dillon Lee took the ball in for a score. The blocked punt is the Crimson Tide's second of the season (also, Ronnie Harrison vs. Middle Tennessee). The block-and-score was also the fourth by Alabama under head coach Nick Saban.

ALABAMA SPECIAL TEAMS RECOVERS ONSIDE KICK: With the Alabama trailing by 13 and under four minutes to play against Ole Miss, the Tide kicked its first onside kick of the season. The boot from placekicker Adam Griffith was placed perfectly with sophomore defensive back Tony Brown recovering the bounce. The onside kick execution was UA's first since Oct. 20, 2007 vs. Tennessee, when Jamie Christensen's game-opening kick was recovered successfully by linebacker Demarcus Waldrop. UA would go on to win that game, 41-17.

BLOCKED PUNT FOR BAMA VS. MTSU: Crimson Tide freshman defensive back Ronnie Harrison blocked Middle Tennessee's punt attempt late in the second quarter of the Tide's home opener on Sept. 12 for a safety. The last time Alabama blocked a punt attempt was Sept. 21, 2013, when Kenyan Drake blocked a Colorado State punt attempt inside Bryant-Denny Stadium.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-LSU SERIES: Alabama leads the series with LSU 49-25-5, which dates back to the 1895 season. The 2015 game will be the 80th meeting between these two long-time Southern football rivals. Since 2005, the LSU-Alabama games have been true battles, with seven of those games being decided by seven points or less. During head coach Nick Saban's tenure in Tuscaloosa, six of the nine duels between the two teams have been decided by that same narrow margin, with three of those games going into overtime. Most recently, a stunning last-minute drive in the fourth quarter by Blake Sims produced a game-tying field goal to send the 2014 matchup into overtime. The Crimson Tide would take the lead, 20-13, as Sims found DeAndrew White in the corner of the end zone for a six-yard score to push UA ahead for the win in Baton Rouge. The Tigers won the inaugural meeting in Baton Rouge, 12-6, on Nov. 18, 1895. The two teams did not meet again until the 1902 season, with LSU prevailing once again. Alabama's first series win came on Nov. 9, 1903, in Baton Rouge as the Crimson Tide scored a 10-0 victory. From 1919-45, Alabama posted a 12-game unbeaten streak (9-0-3) against LSU. The series was resumed during the 1944 season with the Tigers gaining a slight advantage over the next nine meetings, posting a 5-3-1 record from 1946-58. Alabama went 16-2 (.889) against LSU from 1964-81, including a series-long 11-game winning streak from 1971-81. LSU also ended UA's school record 31-game (30-0-1) unbeaten streak with a 17-13 win at Bryant-Denny Stadium in 1993. The Tigers snapped a 15-game winless streak to the Crimson Tide in Tiger Stadium with a 30-28 win in Baton Rouge on Nov. 4, 2000. Alabama snapped a five-game series skid with the 27-21 overtime win in Baton Rouge in 2008 and followed that with a 24-15 win in Tuscaloosa in 2009. In 2011, the Tide fell to the Tigers 9-6 in overtime in the regular-season contest before meeting for the BCS National Championship, where Alabama came out on top, 21-0. Alabama then produced one of the more memorable victories with a come-from-behind 21-17 victory at Tiger Stadium in 2012 as AJ McCarron found T.J. Yeldon on a screen pass for a 28-yard touchdown with 51 second remaining in the game. Alabama pulled away in the second half for a convincing 38-17 win in 2013.

SABAN VS. LSU: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 6-4 in his career against LSU, following last year's 20-13, come-from-behind, overtime win in Baton Rouge. Prior to the road victory, the Tide took down the Tigers handily in 2013 with a 38-17 win that saw UA outgain the Tigers, 96 to -9 yards, in the fourth quarter to break away from the 17-17 tie for the win. Alabama would earn another victory in the final minutes in 2012, coming away with a last-minute, 21-17 win in Baton Rouge. Saban also beat the Tigers in the 2012 BCS National Championship Game (21-0) in New Orleans. Prior to that, Alabama had lost two in a row with a 9-6 overtime defeat in Tuscaloosa on Nov. 5, 2011, and a 24-21 loss in Baton Rouge in 2010. Alabama won the 2008 and 2009 meetings, posting a 27-21 overtime victory in 2008 and a 24-15 win in 2009. Before his arrival in Tuscaloosa, Saban-coached teams were 0-1 against LSU, losing 46-25 to the Tigers while at Michigan State in the 1995 Independence Bowl in Shreveport. Saban was the head coach at LSU from 2000-04 and compiled a 48-16 (.750) record, leading the Tigers to two SEC Championships during his tenure. In 2003, Saban coached the Tigers to a 13-1 record and a 21-14 win over Oklahoma in the BCS National Championship Game played at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, La.

SABAN VS. MILES - ALWAYS RANKED: Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, every Alabama-LSU matchup (nine overall) has seen both teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25. In all of those matchups, at least one of the two teams has been labeled with a top-five ranking or better. The higher-ranked team has gotten the best of its opponent in regular season games, as every year except 2010 the team sitting closer to the top has come away with a win (7-1). The only other instance that the lower-seeded team came away with a win was in the 2011 BCS national title game, when No. 2 Alabama came away with a 21-0 victory over top-ranked LSU at the Louisiana Superdome on the way to the Crimson Tide's 14th national championship.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS: Nick Saban and Les Miles are the only current SEC coaches to win a national championship. Saban led Alabama to the 2009, 2011 and 2012 BCS National Championships and LSU to a 13-1 record and the BCS National Championship in 2003. Miles guided the Tigers to the BCS National Championship in 2007 after taking over for Saban in Baton Rouge.

ALABAMA-LSU AT VARIOUS SITES: The Alabama-LSU series has been played at six different sites since the initial meeting in 1895. The city of Baton Rouge has hosted the most games in the series (38), with Alabama posting a 27-9-2 record on the LSU campus. New Orleans is the only other Louisiana city to host the series, with Alabama and LSU playing to a 7-7 tie in New Orleans in 1921 and the Crimson Tide claiming the 2011 national championship inside the Superdome, 21-0, over the Tigers. Four Alabama cities have played host to this rivalry, including Tuscaloosa, Mobile, Montgomery and Birmingham.

ALABAMA-LSU SERIES IS A LONG ONE: The LSU series is the fifth-longest series in school history. The two teams began playing in 1895, the 15th game in Crimson Tide history, and the 2015 game marks the 80th meeting between the two teams. Only Mississippi State (98), Tennessee (98) and Vanderbilt (83) have played Alabama more than LSU. Auburn and LSU have both played the Tide 79 times.

LSU CONNECTIONS: The Alabama football team has many connections back to LSU and the State of Louisiana with six coaches that worked in the state and 10 players from Louisiana. Tide head coach Nick Saban spent five seasons (2000-04) running the Tigers' program, leading them to the 2003 National Championship and two SEC Championships. Running backs coach Burton Burns grew up in New Orleans and had assistant coaching stints at Tulane, Southern and St. Augustine High School. Defensive coordinator Kirby Smart coached the Tigers' defensive backs in 2004 while Bobby Williams tutored the wide receivers. Bo Davis played for the Tigers and served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at LSU from 2002-05. The Tide's Director of Strength and Conditioning Scott Cochran is an LSU graduate and an assistant strength coach in 2003-04. UA equipment manager Jeff Springer is also an LSU graduate and was an assistant equipment manager for the Tigers from 2003-05. The 10 players from Louisiana include: WR Daylon Charlot (Patterson), LB Denzel Devall (Bastrop), WR Raheem Falkins (New Orleans), DB Hootie Jones (Monroe), PK Gunnar Raborn (Lafayette), OL Cam Robinson (Monroe), WR Cam Sims (Monroe), DL O.J. Smith (Bossier City), DB Bradley Sylve (Port Sulphur) and LB Tim Williams (Baton Rouge).

GENERAL NOTES

SABAN'S HOME RECORD: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 113-19 across his four career stops in home games. He owns the advantage at every stop he has made during his collegiate coaching career, including a 54-7 mark while at Alabama. Saban has won 23 of his last 25 contests inside Bryant-Denny Stadium and has lost back-to-back matchups only one time, with the consecutive losses coming at the end of the 2007 season (LSU and ULM).

SABAN'S SEC HOME RECORD: Alabama head coach Nick Saban owns a 45-10 all-time record when playing in a Southeastern Conference game at home, going 16-4 during his time at LSU and owning a 29-6 record at Alabama. While with the Crimson Tide, Saban has posted four perfect home SEC slates and has not lost more than one home conference game in any season other than 2007 (two losses). All six of his losses at home have been by seven points or less with half of those by three or fewer. Under Saban, Alabama has outscored its SEC home opponents 1,133-517 (32.4-14.8 points per game) and has limited the opposition to 14 points or less on 21 occasions, including six shutouts victories.

SABAN VS. SEC OPPONENTS: Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban owns a 91-26 (.778) career record in 117 games against SEC opponents across three different stops (Michigan State, LSU and Alabama). While at Alabama, he has compiled a 61-13 (.824) record across conference foes, and is outscoring opponents by a staggering 2,977-1,150, or 40.2-15.5 points per game. Of his 13 losses against SEC opponents while at Alabama, all but two (Florida, 2008 and South Carolina, 2010) have been by seven points or less. Saban's first matchup with an SEC team came in the 1995 Independence Bowl against LSU, where his Michigan State Spartans fell, 45-26, to the Tigers. He would later go on to coach LSU to 30-12 overall record against conference opponents.

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is quickly moving up the charts for victories in SEC regularseason games against conference opponents with 90. His 90 wins rank seventh in SEC history, eight wins ahead of current Georgia head coach Mark Richt (82) on the league's list of conference wins. Each coach ahead of them on the list, except for former South Carolina and Florida head coach Steve Spurrier, is in the College Football Hall of Fame. Paul "Bear" Bryant tops the list with 159 conference wins at Kentucky (1946-53) and Alabama (1958-82). Spurrier is second with 131 league wins followed by John Vaught (Ole Miss, 106), Vince Dooley (Georgia, 105), Ralph "Shug" Jordan (Auburn, 98) and Phillip Fulmer (Tennessee, 98). Saban ranks second in league history in SEC regular-season winning percentage at .783 (90-25). He is fifth in league history in all-time winning percentage at .806 (141-34) and ranks ninth all-time for career wins.

TIDE 89-6 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF:

Alabama led Texas A&M, 28-13, at halftime of the Oct. 17 matchup in College Station. With the 41-23 win over the Aggies, the Crimson Tide improved to 89-6 (.937) when leading at halftime under head coach Nick Saban. Alabama has led at the half in five of its eight games this year, trailing Ole Miss and Arkansas, and tied at 7-7 versus Tennessee at the midway point. UA had converted 36 straight halftime leads into wins before falling at Auburn on Nov. 30, 2013. The Crimson Tide had also converted 28 consecutive halftime leads into victories before seeing that streak snapped in 2010 against LSU. The first two losses in that run (when leading at the break) came against LSU, followed by a defeat to Auburn in 2010. In 2007, Alabama held a 20-17 halftime lead before losing to LSU, 41-34, in 2007 at Bryant-Denny Stadium. In 2010, the Tide led 10-3 at the half before the Tigers rallied for a 24-20 win in Death Valley. Alabama lost 28-27 to Auburn to close out the 2010 season, after leading 24-7 at the half. The Crimson Tide is 4-8 under Saban when trailing at halftime after coming away with a victory against Arkansas on Oct. 10, despite trailing 7-3 at half. The four wins in the Saban era when trailing at the half: 34-24 over No. 7 Virginia Tech in 2009 (in Atlanta); a 24-15 over No. 9 LSU in 2009; 24-20 at Arkansas in 2010; 27-14 vs. Arkansas in 2015. He is 4-3 when tied at halftime, and Alabama's four wins under Saban when tied at halftime: at LSU in 2008, (27-21), at Auburn in 2009 (26-21), against Tennessee in 2011 (37-6) and against Tennessee this season (19-14).

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama has compiled a 232-131-4 (.638) all-time record in 367 televised games (not including payper-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts).

86 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 102 GAMES: Following last weekend's 19-14 victory over Tennessee for the annual "Third Saturday in October" matchup on CBS, Alabama has now played in 86 nationally televised games since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest in the past two seasons. The Tide began the 2015 season on ABC with the network carrying the AdvoCare Classic matchup against Wisconsin, before airing live on the SEC Network for the Middle Tennessee contest. Alabama was then featured on ESPN for the Ole Miss game, before returning to the SEC Network once again, this time for the matchup with ULM. The Tide's first contest on CBS came in Athens against Georgia, before the Tide faced off with Arkansas on ESPN. Following the matchup with the Razorbacks, the Tide claimed a 41-23 win over Texas A&M in College Station on CBS. A season ago, UA was televised in eight games on the ABC family of networks including contests with West Virginia (ABC), FAU (SEC Network), Southern Miss (ESPN2), at Arkansas (ESPN), at Tennessee (ESPN2), Western Carolina (SEC Network), the most-viewed college football game ever on ESPN, the Iron Bowl against Auburn and the Sugar Bowl against Ohio State (ESPN). The Tide also played in six contests that were televised on CBS, including versus Florida, at Ole Miss, against Texas A&M, in the Bayou against LSU, versus top-ranked Mississippi State, and finally in the SEC Championship against the Missouri Tigers. Eleven of the Crimson Tide's 13 games in 2013 were televised nationally with the Virginia Tech, Arkansas, Mississippi State and Oklahoma games on ESPN, the Texas A&M, Tennessee, LSU and Auburn games on CBS, the Colorado State and Kentucky games on ESPN2. The Tide played 12 nationally televised games in 2012, with one game on ABC, six on CBS and five on ESPN. In 2011, Alabama played on CBS four times, while having one game on ABC, two on ESPN and ESPN2, and one game on ESPNU. In 2010, Alabama had five games on CBS, three on ESPN, two on ESPN2, one on ABC and one on ESPNU. In 2009, UA played two games on ABC (including the BCS title game), and six on CBS, while ESPN televised two more Crimson Tide games. In 2008, Alabama had 10 of its 14 games televised nationally, including five on CBS, three on ESPN, one on ABC and one on FOX.

ROAD RECORD vs. TOP-25 TEAMS: Alabama is 23-2 in regular season games (does not include bowl games) away from Bryant-Denny Stadium since the start of the 2011 season. The Crimson Tide is 3-0 this season with wins over No. 20 Wisconsin in Arlington, at eighth-ranked Georgia and in College Station against No. 9 Texas A&M. Alabama was 5-1 in 2014, 4-1 in 2013, 6-0 in 2012 and 5-0 in 2011. Alabama is 3-0 all time in games at Texas A&M (1988, 2013 and 2015).

SABAN TIES BRYANT FOR MOST ROAD WINS VS. TOP-10: With Alabama's 41-23 win over Texas A&M in College Station, head coach Nick Saban earned his sixth victory while at UA against a top-10 team on the road, tying Paul "Bear" Bryant for the most road wins versus at a top-10 opponent in Alabama history. The victory improved Saban to 6-1 while in Tuscaloosa.

CRIMSON TIDE STIFLES A&M OFFENSE: Alabama traveled to College Station on Oct. 17 to face off with an explosive Texas A&M offense. Entering the game, the Aggies had scored at least 28 points in every game and were near the tops of every offensive category in the SEC. The Crimson Tide limited the Aggies to 23 points and held A&M below numerous season averages on offense. The UA defense also allowed just one offensive touchdown on the day. Below is a breakdown of Alabama's defensive performance.

GEORGIA EQUALS LARGEST ROAD WIN OVER TOP-10 TEAM:

Alabama's 28-point victory margin in the 38-10 win over Georgia on Oct. 10 is the largest winning margin ever by a Crimson Tide team against a top-10 team at an opposing site. It also stands as the second-largest victory margin ever constructed by Alabama against a top-10 team in any game, ranking behind only a 42-point defeat (49-7) of Michigan State at the Capital One Bowl that closed out the 2010 season. The previous largest winning margin for the Tide versus an SEC top-10 opponent was a 28-point victory over Florida (31-3) in Tuscaloosa in 2005.

UA TIES LARGEST ROAD WIN vs. AP TOP-10 SEC OPPONENT:

The Crimson Tide's 38-10 win over Georgia on Oct. 3 marked the largest road win against an AP top-10 SEC team in program history and tied for the largest win on the road against an SEC top-10 team in the history of the poll. The 28 points tied Florida State (1987) and Tennessee (1951) for the largest margin of victory over an AP top-10 opponent on the road.

TIDE'S SUCCESS IN SEPTEMBER: Alabama has gone 30-1 in September since 2008. Adding games in August, that record improves to 33-1. The Crimson Tide's only losses in September came on Sept. 19 against Ole Miss, and before that on September 20, 2007, to Florida State in Jacksonville by a score of 21-14.

ALABAMA-WISCONSIN DRAWS HUGE RATINGS: The season opening matchup on ABC's *Saturday Night Football* between the Alabama Crimson Tide and Wisconsin Badgers was college football's highest-rated game of the day, achieving a 4.3 overnight rating nationally, which was up five percent from the same window last season (Oklahoma State vs. Florida State). More impressively, the game received a 46.7 rating in Birmingham which is the highest-rated regular season game on ABC dating back to 2004.

FIRST TIME PLAYERS IN ARLINGTON: Alabama had some new faces on the field for the season opener against the Wisconsin Badgers. True freshmen Shawn Burgess-Becker (DB), Lester Cotton (OL), Minkah Fitzpatrick (DB), Damien Harris (RB), Ronnie Harrison (DB), Daron Payne (DL), Calvin Ridley (WR) and Dallas Warmack (OL) all saw action. In addition, redshirt freshmen Keith Holcombe (LB), Marlon Humphrey (DB) and Christian Miller (LB) made their first appearance. Oregon State transfer Richard Mullaney (WR) made his first appearance in a Crimson Tide uniform as well.

NEW HIRES: Nick Saban made two new additions to his 2015 staff during the offseason, hiring Tosh Lupoi to coach the outside linebackers and bringing in Mel Tucker to lead the secondary. Lupoi enters a full-time role after serving as an analyst a season ago. He has previous experience as an assistant coach at Washington and Cal, where he coached future first-rounders Danny Shelton, Cameron Jordan and Tyson Alualu. Tucker joins the Crimson Tide staff following a two-year stint as the defensive coordinator of the NFL's Chicago Bears. Tucker also served as defensive coordinator of the Jacksonville Jaguars (2009-12) and Cleveland Browns (2008). He originally linked up with Saban as a graduate assistant at Michigan State in 1997 and stayed in East Lansing for two years.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is well-represented in the NFL heading into the 2015-16 season with numerous former players dotting league rosters. The Tide has 40 former players (35 active, five injured reserve, practice squad or currently suspended) earning a spot on an NFL roster this season. The Tide currently has the third-most players on an active NFL roster, with LSU at the top with 38 players just one ahead of second place Miami (Fla.). Alabama leads all colleges in producing offensive linemen, with eight currently spotting NFL rosters.

In the last seven NFL Drafts, Alabama has had 48 players selected, including 17 players in first round, 11 in the second and third rounds, five in the fourth, seven in the fifth, one in the sixth and seven in the seventh round.

- Saban has a 184-60-1 (.753) record as a college head coach to date. He has four national championships three at Alabama six conference championships and 16 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons.
- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships. He is the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships and has won four titles in his last nine years coaching college football. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy (Notre Dame 1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne (Nebraska 1994-95, 1997). He is also just the fourth coach in he poll era to win four national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant, John McKay and Leahy).
- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game.
- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.
- His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).
- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.
- In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.
- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.
- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and a daughter-in-law, Kelsé.
- At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Saban's have helped raise approximately \$5 million for "Nick's Kids" that has been distributed to more than 250 charities and organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the Southeast. The Sabans also built 15 homes, one for each of the Tide's national championships, with Project Team Up and Habitat for Humanity following the April 27, 2011, tornado that stuck Tuscaloosa.
- In June of 2008, the Sabans announced a \$1 million gift to benefit Alabama's first-generation scholarship program. The gift has a special meaning to the Sabans as both Nick and Terry were both first-generation graduates.

Henry opened up the game's scoring, breaking off a 37-yard run in the first quarter to put Alabama ahead 7-0. He put up two more scores in the third quarter, including a 56-yard touchdown rush that put him over 100 yards for the night, the sixth time in his career he has eclipsed the century mark in a game.

Senior quarterback Jake Coker, making his debut as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, was an efficient 15-of-21 for 213 yards and one touchdown to go along with no turnovers. Sophomore Cooper Bateman also saw action in the second half, finishing 7-for-8 with 51 yards. Defensively, Alabama was dominant at the line of scrimmage, holding the Badgers to just 40 yards rushing on 21 attempts, an average of 1.9 yards per rush. Senior linebacker recorded 12 total tackles, including five solo. Additionally, Jonathan Allen had two sacks and the team broke up seven passes on the night.

ATHENS, Ga. — The 13th-ranked Alabama Crimson Tide was resourceful in all phases of the game and dominant defensively while showcasing an opportunistic offense in a 38-10 rout of 8th-ranked Georgia before a capacity crowd of 92.746 on a rainy day at Sanford Stadium. In a game played mostly in a steady rain, senior quarterback Jake Coker and the Alabama offense were efficient while the defense had both Bulldogs quarterbacks under duress all game long. Coker had a rushing and passing touchdown, junior running back Derrick Henry added another touchdown on the ground, and the Tide scored on a 50-yard interception return by junior defensive back Eddie Jackson and on a blocked punt by freshman defensive back Minkah Fitzpatrick.

Freshman receiver Calvin Ridley caught five passes for 120 yards, his first game over the century mark, and one touchdown while Henry set a new career-high in attempts (26) and rushing yards (148). The Alabama defense was a disruptive force in the wet conditions all day, forcing a total of four turnovers, including three interceptions by three different members of the secondary. Georgia's two quarterbacks completed only 11 of 31 pass attempts and averaged 3.2 yards per pass. The Tide gained 379 yards of offense (190 passing and 189 rushing) and converted 15 first downs. The Bulldogs picked up 299 yards for the game (106 passing and 193 rushing) along with converting 12 first downs.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — The University of Alabama Crimson Tide football team turned in a gritty performance on Saturday night to defeat the Arkansas Razorbacks, 27-14, in the 2015 Homecoming game before a capacity crowd of 101,821 at Bryant-Denny Stadium on the Alabama campus.

Alabama erased a 7-3 deficit late in the third quarter on an 81-yard pass from quarterback Jake Coker to wide receiver Calvin Ridley, a play that awoke a slumbering offense that had struggled to finish drives most of the game to that point. That score, with 1:39 left in the third period, turned the game in Alabama's favor as the Crimson Tide stopped an Arkansas drive at the Hogs' 43 on the ensuing possession and marched to a touchdown on a 3-yard pass from Coker to wideout Richard Mullaney for a 17-7 lead. After an Eddie Jackson interception for the Tide a few plays later, Alabama tacked on a 35-yard Adam Griffith field goal for a 20-7 edge with 10:07 left in the fourth quarter. Derrick Henry added a 1-yard touchdown run with 2:44 left, marking the 11th consecutive game in which he has scored on the ground.

COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS — The 10th-ranked University of Alabama football team used a punishing rushing offense and big plays from its defense to defeat No. 9-ranked Texas A&M, 41-23, before a crowd of 105,733 at Kyle Field. Alabama intercepted four passes, returning three for touchdowns, to knock off the previously unbeaten Aggies. Crimson Tide running back Derrick Henry rushed for 236 yards and two touchdowns while cornerbacks Minkah Fitzpatrick and Eddie Jackson nabbed two interceptions each. Jackson returned one for a 93-yard touchdown as the Tide defense scored three times – a first in Alabama history. Fitzpatrick scored two touchdowns via interception returns, first on a 33-yard return in the first quarter, and later on a game-clinching 55-yarder. For Alabama, quarterback Jake Coker passed for 138 yards while completing 19-of-25

Alabama built a 28-6 lead midway through the second quarter with Henry rushing 15 explosive A&M offense 189 total yards. After Fitzpatrick's interception return, Henry rumbled 55 yards to pay dirt with 5:26 left in the opening stanza before tacking on a 6-yard scoring run with 14:51 left in the half. Jackson's 93-yard scoring play extended the lead to 28-6 before A&M struck back on a 68-yard punt return touchdown by Christian (14) and 15 Kirk with 3:03 left in the first half. Alabama led, 28-13, at halftime. A&M narrowed the Alabama lead to 28-20 early in the third period on a 3-yard pass from quarterback Kyle Allen to wide receiver Ricky Seals-Jones. The Tide extended its lead to 34-20 on a pair of Adam Griffith field goals before A&M's Taylor Bertolet hit a 36-yard field goal with 7:57 left in the fourth quarter, Bertolet's third counter of the game. Fitzpatrick stopped an Aggie drive with his second interception of the day, which he returned 55 yards for his second score of the game. It set a Crimson Tide record for interceptions return for a touchdown, both for the team and an individual.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — In a tight, hard-hitting struggle that lived up to the legacy of one of college football's most history-rich rivalries, the 8th-ranked University of Alabama football team used a clutch touchdown drive by its offense and a staunch outing from its defense to overcome a late deficit in a 19-14 win over Tennessee on Saturday afternoon before a capacity crowd of 101,821 at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

After Tennessee tailback Jalen Hurd ran 12 yards for a touchdown with 5:49 left, the Tide offense responded with a decisive 71-yard march to the end zone. Tide quarterback Jake Coker completed key passes of 29 yards to wide receiver ArDarius Stewart and 15 yards to wide receiver Calvin Ridley on the drive that was punctuated by running back Derrick Henry's tough running. Henry carried five times for 35 yards on the winning drive, including the game-winning 14-yard touchdown run with 2:24 left.

Henry rushed for 143 yards and two touchdowns, Stewart had six catches for 114 yards, and Coker passed for 247 yards while completing 21-of-27 passes. Linebacker Reggie Ragland led the Tide defense with a game-high 12 tackles (eight solos), including a tackle for loss and punter J.K. Scott averaged 49.8 yards on four punts, including a 56-yarder.
